**RESIGNATION OF STEWARDS IN W. E. STERLING SPECIAL MEET**

**By No Means Surprise to M.P.B. Executive—The Coming A. A. U. of C. Meeting.**

The resignation of Mr. W. E. Sterling, Vice President of the Maritime Province branch received by President Doyle a few days ago was by no means a surprise. Ernie as he is familiarly known has been the centre of much comment in Saint John of late due to the many baseball squabbles. It seems that the Saint John and Moncton delegates were much against him and no doubt he felt the wisest move to make to avoid further unfair and uncharitable criticism was to place his resignation in the proper hands.

Sterling was a prodigious worker, and the way New Brunswick today is athletically organized speaks well of his efforts. Although resigning from the Vice Presidency there is no doubt that Ernie will stand firm for Maritime union rather than secession.

The writer has been informed that Mr. H. E. Blackney of Moncton has been appointed provincial president and also that Mr. Joe Kennedy of Saint John is named as a delegate to the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada meeting being held in Saint John in December; also that Mr. A. W. Harris of Pictou replaces A. C. Millie as an M. P. B. delegate at said meeting.

The Halifax Meeting

Referring to the meeting held in Halifax last Friday it is hardly conceivable that Cape Breton or Sydney in particular would endorse a movement emanating from A. C. Millie, W. C. Bishop, Pat Neville and others.

In justice to Mr. S. F. Doyle, President of the M. P. B. it may be said that during the past two seasons Cape Breton has enjoyed consideration from the M. P. B. for the first time in a goodly number of years. Last year in hockey when Sydney was barred from the A. P. C. League, Doyle succeeded in arranging a play-off between Truro, A. P. C. winners and Sydney. Similar arrangements were also made re basketball. Take for example baseball this year—I am informed that there were ten amateur baseball teams operating in Cape Breton last summer. This speaks well for those behind such organization and proves conclusively that the M. P. B. was not placing any obstacles in the way to dampen their efforts.

If the M. P. B. past executive had done more towards boosting athletic conditions in Cape Breton instead of harping on some trivialities there would not have been the athletic chaos down there and Cape Breton would have been the M. P. B.'s right bower today.

It is then to be hoped that the present management of athletic activities in Cape Breton will not allow themselves to be duped into sectional tendencies conceived by such men as Messrs. Millie, Bishop and Neville who have been identified with independent and semi-professional sport for many years.

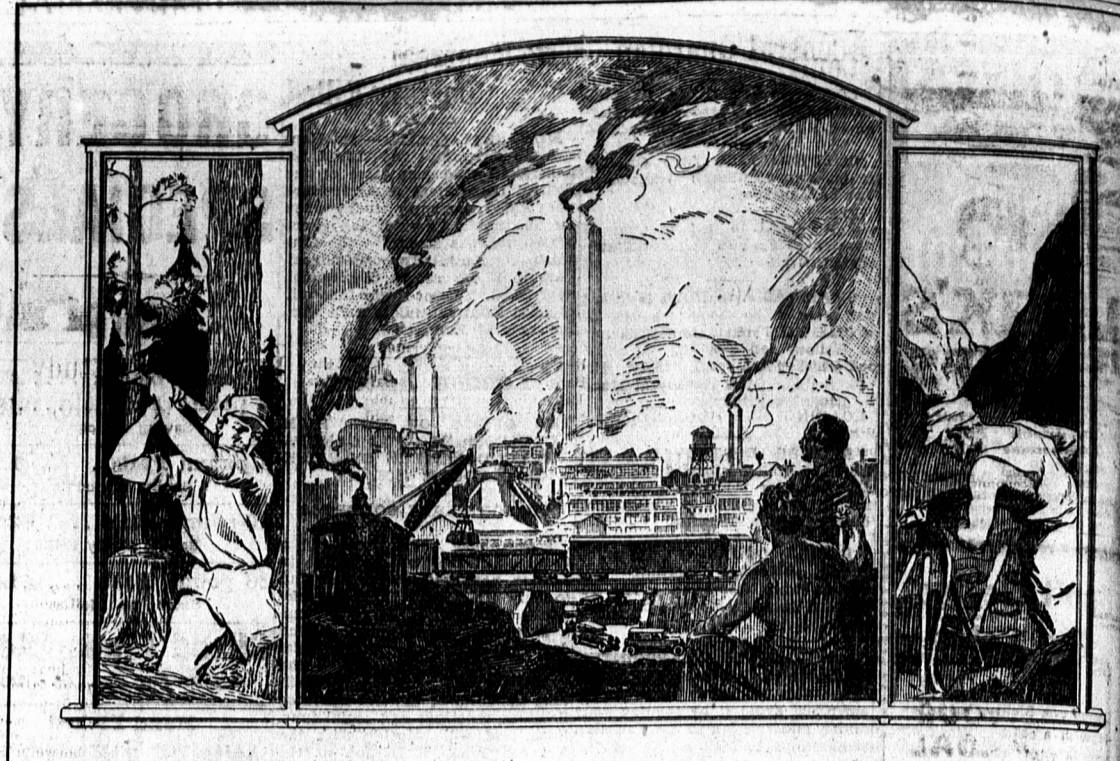
The Coming Meeting

ST. JOHN, Oct. 25.—The Wanderers administered a defeat to the Nationals at the Allison grounds on Saturday afternoon when they won out by a 9-5 score. The game provided much excitement for the few fans who gave themselves the treat of watching the City League fixture.

The territory play was about even and the play, although almost entirely in close formation, was interesting, except when the referee became the object of their "wordy" endeavors to the detriment of the game. After four minutes of play close to the Nationals' line the Wanderers succeeded in going over after a mix-up. Later in the first half the Nationals scored on a fumble pass behind the Wanderers' line and Wiltzien succeeded in converting the try, the half ending 5-3 in favor of the Nationals.

In the second half Wanderers scored again when Waters went over after a mass play, O'Toole failing to convert from a difficult angle. In the last five minutes of play Geary, of the Wanderers by a kick inside his own 25-yard line, started an advance which by splendid following-up of the ball enabled him to cross the line for the final try which was not converted, the game ending 9-5 in favor of the Wanderers.

**McGill Beats Sun Life by 24-0, in M'tier Cup Final Elimination**

MONTREAL, Oct. 25.—McGill's English rugby team defeated Sun Life of Montreal here Saturday by a score of 24 to 0 in the final elimination game (Quebec district) for the MacTier Cup, emblematic of English rugby supremacy in Canada. McGill will now meet the Ontario district finalists, the winner of the latter series to face University of New Brunswick, the present holders of the cup.

Senior Rugby in Eastern Canada was marked by further upsets on Saturday. In the lone game in the Inter-Collegiate Union, Queen's University, holders of the title for the last four seasons, came back after defeat at the hands of the University of Toronto and blanked McGill's red and white team at Kingston, 14-0. On a heavy field McGill was conceded to be at a disadvantage, but after its great fight in beating Toronto two weeks ago, McGill was expected to hold its own much better than it did. Queen's showed championship form with its team strengthened by the addition of Carl Voss, a passing mite to the famous Harry Batstone on the tri-color half line.

Fumbles by the McGill backs demoralized the red and white squad, which held Queen's to 2-0 at half time, but which collapsed completely in the last half.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—An already scrambled situation in the past was made into a football omelette as a result of Saturday's play. Eleven regarded as under dogs rose to deal fatal blows to oppressors of years, and other teams made what had been long shot contests close enough to hold the handicappers to ridicule.

A brown bear that walked like a man at New Haven projected the Bruins into the front row of the football pictures with a victory over Yale, the first Brown triumph in ten years. Not so significant from a standpoint of mythical championships but vastly gratifying to Harvard supporters encouraged by the enthusiasm of a charging crimson line, was the defeat administered to Dartmouth at Cambridge. Harvard had been on the short end of Green scores for three consecutive seasons.

The Army took things easy in defeating Boston University in preparation for an anticipated crucial game with Yale Saturday.

**Mount A. Defeats Moncton in Good Game on Saturday**

MONCTON, Oct. 25.—Taking advantage of a slack period in the Moncton defense after that team had put over a try that tied the score, 3-3, in the middle of the second period, the Mount Allison Varsity Rugby squad forced across a try immediately after the kickoff and another one about ten minutes later, to pull through a hard fought battle to win from the local fifteen by a 9-3 score on the M. A. field here Saturday afternoon.

Although the field was in a somewhat muddy condition which prohibited much flashy half line work and dodging the game was easily the best exhibition of Rugby that has been witnessed here in years.

The first try of the game came near the close of the initial session, when Rice, the flashy half back for the collegians, scored on a beautiful end run, which was not converted. Moncton came back strong in the second period and tied up the count after about fifteen minutes of play when Brown followed through on a free kick

by Peake, but they spent no time on the tremendous rally garnet and gold made from kickoff and Rice again put team in the lead after a beautiful play started by Capt. Roy Smith who broke through the red white first line of defense, passed to Miller to Rice, the crossing the line near the posts. The try was not converted.

The last try of the game made on another run set by Smith, who passed out to Rice to Lister and, although latter was called near the line, he managed to get the ball to White, who plunged across the third try.
