OLD TRINITY BUILDING PASSES INTO HISTORY

Large Part Of Building To Be Torn Down Soon Because Regarded As Unsafe.

TORONTO, June 8.—(BY THE CANADIAN PRESS) Historic old Trinity College, Queen street west, Toronto, will soon be in the hands of wreckers, as the Park Commissioners, C. F. Chambers, has asked for tenders for the demolition of the wings of the college and the students residence. Only the central wing of the old college building will remain when the wreckers have finished their work, and playgrounds will take the place of the buildings torn down. The demolition of a large part of the original building has been decided upon as a measure of safety to children playing in Trinity Park the former college grounds.

On St. Patrick's Day, 1851, the first sod was turned on Trinity College grounds by Bishop Strachan in the presence of a large number of citizens. The college was built by the munificence of those who, both in Great Britain and in the

Diocese of Toronto, gave with willing hands gifts of money and land for the accomplishment of the object aimed at by the founders. Bishop Strachan was the first President. A portion of the building was completed in 1852. This is the main building, which will be the only part left standing after the present wrecking is completed.

The materials used were white bricks made in Yorkville, then a village on Gange street north of bloor street, now part of the city of Toronto, and stone from Cleveland, which harmonizes in color with the brick. In 1884 the chapel on the east side was opened, and was spoken of by competent authorities as a gem of ecclesiastical architecture. The west wing was added in 1891, and eastern in 1894. These buildings are now to be torn down.

New Trinity College is situated near the University of Toronto with which it is affiliated.

Welsh Miners Being Trained For Canadian Farms

(Special to the Guardian) MONTREAL, June 8.—For the purpose of assisting in the training of 85 Welsh miners in farm work before their departure for Canada, R. MacEwing of the colonization department of the Canadian National Railways, has been loaned to the British ministry of labour for three weeks. It was stated this morning by Dr. W. J. Black, director of agriculture and colonization of the Canadian National System. The trainees will leave at the completion of their six weeks course of intensive training in Canadian farm methods. They are living under canvas during their course. Canadian wagons and Canadian harnesses are being used so that the new comers on arrival in Canada will be familiar with the equipment used on the farms of this country. Mr. MacEwing himself emigrated from Wyrlyshire in 1908 and after working for three years as a farm laborer in Saskatchewan secured his own farm. He still owns 160 acres of land near Rosetown, Sask.

Haying Begins In British Columbia

That Car Of Yours

Heart-to-Heart Talks With Automobile Owners and Drivers as to How to Get the Most Out of Their Cars at the Least Expense.

OFTEN, BUT NOT ALWAYS

At this time of year, when the mercury climbs to the upper reaches, the average motorist is far from alarmed when the oil pressure gauge runs lower than usual. It is just the heat, the car owner reasons. Very often it is, but frequently it is not and the motorist who is aware of the importance of proper lubrication will not construe every drop in the pressure gauge as being due to high temperature. The difference between Winter and Summer readings is by no means as great as many car owners are prone to believe.

ASK A FELLOW MOTORIST

With touring getting under way on a grand scale, travelers in strange cities are making a mistake that is by no means uncommon. The error in question is that of asking the passing pedestrian concerning some phase of the local traffic regulations. The chances are that he does not know. Asking a fellow motorist is a better way, though the best is to go to police headquarters or to the motor club, unless one is merely passing through the city and does not feel the expense in time justified. Watching the local driver and using common-sense will help a lot.

TO BE ABSOLUTELY SAFE

Changing a flat tire on the busy country road of a Sunday afternoon is an irksome job. It may be an unsafe one, too, depending upon the narrowness of the road, the volume of traffic, and several other factors. There is one way, however, in which the element of danger can be removed. That is by pulling the car entirely off the highway before attempting to make the change. If conditions do not permit this, at least two wheels of the car should be clear.

HAVE A LOOK AT BELT

Does the engine run hot in spite of the fact that it is clear of carbon and that the timing is correct? Then, have a look at the fan belt. Frequently, the belt slips and the fan is inefficient. If the belt is in bad condition, as many are, the present is an excellent time to replace it with a new one.

JARRED LOOSE AT SPEED

Headlight adjustments are related in their accuracy to the use to which the car is subjected. If it is taken over rough roads at high speeds for a considerable period, the headlights are likely to be adversely affected. This frequently happens at this season of the year. It will pay, therefore, to have the focusing and aiming of the lights checked at reasonable periods.

CHANGE IT REGARDLESS

The service station attendant, checking over the differential and transmission for adequacy of lubricant, may find that they are safe as to quantity. Ordinarily the motor car owner is fully satisfied with such a report. He should not be. Quantity is not enough, for the lubricant must have quality as well. It cannot have after a specified mileage and the safe policy is to have the old grease or oil removed every 5,000 miles at least.

BE GENEROUS, IT PAYS

It is a mistake to repair a puncture with a small patch, as many motorists have discovered. Care, therefore, should be exercised in cutting the patch to see that it is more than ample. It is far better to err on the side of too much than too little, although, through indifference, the average man frequently makes the latter error.
