V.O.N. Activities Reviewed At Rotary

The Victorian Order of Nurses has branches in every Province of Canada except Prince Edward Island and is carrying on its work of giving nursing care, prevention of disease and promotion of health in cooperation with the Dominion Provincial, Municipal and other health agencies in 105 towns and cities, said Miss L. G. Hall, Supervisor of the V.O.N. at Rotary luncheon on Monday.

Miss Hall said she is visiting the Province on holiday and was pleased to have an opportunity to speak of the work of her Order.
