CHANGE IN WEATHER HURTS GRAIN CROP

Edmonton, June 28. — Reports received from south of Calgary indicate that during the past fortnight several windy days with high temperatures have checked growth which up to that time had been very satisfactory, according to the fortnightly crop report of the Department of Agriculture. In the central and eastern parts of the Province rains within the past few days have done much to relieve the serious condition caused by continued dry weather and high winds. Estimates place the damage from wind and cut-worms as high as 40 per cent. Much of this land has been reseeded, but in some cases this was impossible owing to the difficulty in securing seed. The Peace River District continues to have abundant moisture, with slight damage from floods in the eastern part. Hay and pasture crops are reported to be doing well, except in areas which have suffered so severely from high winds and lack of moisture. Sugar-beet crop is about 70 per cent. thinned. Some damage has been done by cut-worms, but otherwise the outlook is promising.

DOMINION TEXTILE

While it was generally expected that the annual report of Dominion Textile Company, Limited, for the fiscal year ended March 31st, 1930, would show the common dividend earned by a substantial margin, the actual earnings were a pleasant surprise in that they amounted to \$6.08

per share or well over 20 percent above dividend requirements. In the preceding year the amount available for common stock was smaller, but as the number of shares outstanding on which dividends were paid was also lower the per share earnings were \$6.47. If figured on the same number of shares, the 1929 earnings would have been equal to \$5.67 as against the showing of \$6.08 in 1930. While operating revenue was lower at \$1,518,321 the income derived from investments showed a sharp increase of over \$200,000 so that the combined net profit exceeded \$2,000,000 and was the highest since 1927.
