NOTES ON THE P. E. ISLAND EGG LAYING CONTEST FOR THE 4th WEEK OF THE CONTEST, ENDING SEPTEMBER 11, 1925.

There was a gain of 17 eggs in the contest during the past week. The total number of eggs laid was 579, the total to date 3394. The production for the week is 48.5%. Mr. G. F. Conners' pen of white Leghorns led the contest for the week, with a production of 51 eggs; Mrs. F. Halliday's pen of Barred Rocks was second, with 43 eggs; Mr. J. Spurgeon Jenkins' Barred Rocks tied with Mr. Joseph Carriker's Barred Rocks for third place with 41 eggs; Mr. W. G. McDonald's Barred Rocks were 4th, with 39 eggs; Mr. Sam McPherson's White Leghorns tied with the Barred Rocks of Mr. Harry Hyde and Mr. Charles Parker for 5th place, with a production of 38 eggs each; Mr. Edward Bulphitt's White Leghorns No. 3 tied with the Charles McKenna's Barred Rocks for sixth place, with 37 eggs; Mrs. Fred McIntyre's White Leghorns were 7th, with 33 eggs; Mr. Bert Brown's White Leghorns were 8th, with 32 eggs; Mr. W. W. Murch's Barred Rocks for 8th place with 32 eggs each.

Mr. G. F. Conner's White Leghorns have increased their lead to 18 eggs, their production to date being 1977 eggs; Mrs. S. MacNeil's pen of White Leghorns No. 2, with 1939 eggs; Mr. J. P. Carmichael's Barred Rocks are third with a production of 1559; Mr. Walter Buntain's Barred Rocks are fourth, with 1785 eggs; Mr. Edward Bull, Wilt's pen of White Leghorns No. 2 are 5th, with 1765; Mrs. Fred McPherson's White Leghorns are sixth, with 1754 eggs; Mr. W. G. McDonald's Barred Rocks are 7th, with 1707 eggs; Mr. Charles McKenna's Barred Rocks are eighth, with 1690 eggs; Mr. A. Wilmer's White Wyandottes are ninth, with 1652 eggs; and Mr. Everett Howatt's White Leghorns are 10th, with 1620 eggs.

shown by the important provisions of the Quebec act for which he was personally responsible. Sir Charles was the third son of Christopher Carleton, a landowner and country town, of a family that came originally from Cumberland in the north of England. His father died when he was fourteen years of age, but his mother afterwards married the Rev. Thomas Shelton, a man of ability and fine character, who had no small share in moulding the quality that made Carleton what he afterwards became. He was given a liberal education, and at the age of eighteen entered the army with the commission of ensign. He saw service on the continent, and steadily rose in rank. He entered Canadian history in 1758 at the siege of Louisbourg. On December 30, 1758, he was appointed quartermaster general and colonel in America. Six days under Wolfe before Quebec he was wounded at the battle of the Plains of Abraham September 13, 1759, when in command of the Grenadiers. He was appointed lieutenant governor of Quebec, April 7, 1765, and became the administrator of the colony after Murray's departure in June, 1766. He received his commission as governor of Canada on April 12, 1768. In 1770 he went to England on leave of absence, and was made a member of the House of Commons by his stay in England. He was largely instrumental in securing the adoption of the Quebec act of 1774, which represented his views. He returned to Canada the same year, and was appointed commander in chief of the British forces in Canada. Before he could establish the new form of government, the Americans invaded the province in 1775. General Montgomery having captured St. John and entered Montreal, Carleton, who had no army, retired to Quebec. He fortified the town, organized the French and British militia, defeated Montgomery in his attack on December 31, 1775, and upon the arrival of a British squadron, May 1776 put to rout the besieging army, and in a few weeks freed the Americans out of Canada. In reward for saving Quebec and Canada to England, he was nominated a member of the House of Commons, Carleton's first term of office as governor terminated in June, 1778, but he returned as governor and as Baron Dorchester in October, 1786 and held office during the following ten years. He did all in his power to secure fair treatment for the loyalists who were in the revolting colonies that had obtained their independence, and with all the means at his command, he assisted the loyalists who came to Canada. It was during the second term that Canada was divided into the two provinces of Upper and Lower Canada, and an elective legislature given each. He took his final departure from Quebec July 9, 1796. He was raised to the rank of general by the army in 1793. He died suddenly on November 10, 1808.

cove sometime called Canoe cove, from which the settlement name comes. Refer to Allen cove, Cantalot, creek, lot 53, Charlottetown, 1846.

Cape Traverse; settlement with post office, lot 28. Refer to Traverse cove.

Cardigan; bay, point, river and settlement with post office, Kings county, Holland 1765. After George Brudenell (1712-90), fourth Earl of Cardigan, created Duke of Montagu 1768; married 1730, Mary only child of John, Duke of Montagu. His mother was the eldest sister of Charles Bruce, 4th Earl of Ailesbury and 3rd Earl of Ailesbury. His only son John, Lord Brudenell, born 1735 and created Lord Montagu of Bouchton 1762, died 1770 (see Bouchton bay, river, point and islands; Brudenell point and river and Bruce point, Montagu river. The Moemac Indian name of Cardigan bay is Samkeok meaning "sandy shore." Known to the French as Trois Rivières (Three Rivers).

Cardross; settlement, lot 53 A post office January 1, 1895, to June 1, 1914. Cardross is a village in Dumfriesshire, Scotland.

Carey; point, lot 8.

Carleton; settlement, lot 6, Meacham, 1880.

Carleton; cove, lot 27, Holland 1765. After General Sir Guy Carleton (1724-1808) 1st Baron Dorchester (1786), who has been called the greatest of all governors of Canada. During two terms of eight years each—terms separated by ten years—he was the representative of a government whose intentions towards the new possessors were ill-defined and often misinterpreted. But he laid well and deep the foundations of the Canada of today, notably in fighting in London for the rights of the colonists, November 10, 1808.
