NOTED MARRIAGE IN WASHINGTON

EVERETT, Wash., August 11.—The following interesting item is taken from the Morning Tribune of Everett, Wash., of July 9th. The first Presbyterian church was brilliantly lighted and decorated last evening for the marriage of Miss Isabel McKee, daughter of John and Mrs. McKee, to Percy Dearle of Seattle. The ceremony was performed at 8 o'clock, Rev. Herbert Thompson officiating, the ring service being conducted before the ceremony. Miss McKee, accompanied by Professor Malone, Miss Catharine, who played the organ, and the bridesmaids, Miss Mary and Miss Helen, entered the church at the side front door. Proceeding the bride was little Irene Thompson, 16 years old, wearing a ring slipped over a pink rosebud on a silver tray, and then the little flower girls, Katherine and Dorothy Dearle, niece of the groom, dressed in fluffy white dresses and pink bows. The bridesmaid Miss Myrtle Williams, came next in a dainty white figured gown and carried a shower bouquet of pink sweet peas. The bride came in on the arm of her father and met the groom and his best man, Louis McKee, brother of the bride, at the altar. The groom and his best man were in full evening dress. The bride was charming in white silk crepe de chine over white tulle, and carried a large bouquet of bride's roses. Mrs. John McKee, mother of the bride, wore blue silk. The church decorations were beautiful, being in charge of the choir, and the Christian Endeavor society, with which the bride has been connected since childhood. The color scheme of the decorations were white and green. The altar was banked with ferns and greenery and white roses. The space directly back of the altar was curtained with net, interwoven with delicate sprays of smilax from which was suspended by broad white satin ribbons a large hall of white carnations. The windows were decorated with large sprays of ferns and hanging baskets of white roses, and white carnations and marguerites were hung in the open doors and archedways. Large clusters of white marguerites decorated the chairs down the center aisle, through which the bride party passed. The ushers were Harry Lansdowne, Lloyd Black, Stowell Challacombe and William Pitts. Immediately following the ceremony a reception was held at the home, 1828 Colby avenue, for the immediate relatives of the bride and groom. The rooms were beautifully decorated for the occasion, red roses and green being used in the hall, and the parlors and dining room were filled with pink roses. The bride received a great number of beautiful and costly presents. The bride has always lived in Everett, her father John McKee, being a pioneer, having built the first house in Everett. She has been identified with the First Presbyterian church and is well known in a church and social circles. Mrs. Dearle is a University graduate and a member of the Beta Theta Pi fraternity. He is manager of the university bookstore, which position he has held for five years. Mr. and Mrs. Dearle will be at home in Seattle after August 1, at University station. (Miss McKee referred to visited here last year, while Mr. McKee was formerly of Bonshaw, P.E.I., and a number of years ago taught school in North Tryon.

—Rev. J. A. and Mrs. Winfield of St. Stephen, N. B., crossed over to the island on Thursday by the Empress, and intend spending some time on the North Shore. Mr. Winfield preached to a congregation in St. Mark's Church, Kington, on Sunday evening last. Their many friends are delighted to see them looking so well.

—The inquest on the body of Fred Seaman, who was killed at Kensington station on Tuesday evening last took place yesterday at Kensington, before coroner Dr. Durrach and the following jury, James Pratt, foreman, Colledge Bowness, Hugh Morrison, John Palmer, James Braham, Daniel McKennie and Wm. Hogg. There were in all nine witnesses examined. The evidence as given at the inquest showed that he was a passenger from Hunter River to Kensington, accompanied by some excursionists from the Hunter River station when the train was not to stop there, but was determined to jump from the train. Several of those who were with him tried to prevent him from doing so, but he persisted that there was no danger, as he had jumped from trains going faster before. The evidence did not show definitely the manner in which he was killed, but the position of the body which was found between the rails, tended to show that he evidently was dragged under the wheels while holding on to the railings of the car. The jury returned a verdict of accidental death, caused by jumping from the train, and that he was traveling at a rapid rate past the station, and that he was accidentally killed by being drawn under the train, after jumping or falling between the cars. The body was taken in charge, after being viewed by the coroner on Tuesday evening, by Undertaker Bowness and prepared for burial, and was forwarded by the morning train yesterday in charge of his brother to Hunter River.
