N. B. Potato Case In Supreme Court

OTTAWA, Oct. 22.—Alleged failure to deliver 20 carloads of potatoes under a contract formed the basis of a case appealed to the Supreme Court of Canada yesterday. The appellant is Thompson and Alix, Ltd., of Sherbrooke, Que., who sought to have set aside a judgment of the Supreme Court of New Brunswick which set aside a verdict entered by the trial judge and ordered a new trial. Judgment was reserved.

Thompson and Alix, Ltd., claimed damages of \$3,290 from B. F. Smith, of Florenceville, N. B. At the second trial of the action the judge entered a verdict for the plaintiffs although the jury found against them. The Supreme Court of New Brunswick held the trial judge was bound to give effect to the findings of the jury even if he considered them improper.

Railway Bill In The Senate Next Week

Free State Increases Its Tariff

DUBLIN, Oct. 22.—Increases in tariffs on a large number of manufactured goods and semi-finished articles will go into effect on Thursday. The rates will range from 15 to 50 per cent ad valorem and reveal certain varying reductions for Imperial preference. The new tariff schedule was announced in the Dail this afternoon by the Minister of Industry of the Irish Free State Government, Sean Lemass.

The new list of tariffs introduced includes: Yarns, general 22½ per cent; Imperial, 15 per cent. Articles of gold, silver, electroplate, platinum, copper, brass, bronze gunmetal and date stamps, general 15; Imperial 10. Upholstery spring, general 37½; Imperial 25. Optical goods, general 50; Imperial 33½. Fancy jewelry, general 30; Imperial 20.

Manufactured articles, general 10; Imperial 10. Tinplate, with exceptions, general 15; Imperial 10. Wood articles, including sleepers, scaffolding, telegraph poles and excluding crucifixes, general 50; Imperial 33. Roof felting and felting substitutes, general 37½; Imperial 25. Cordage, cables, ropes and twine of hemp, general 30; Imperial 20.

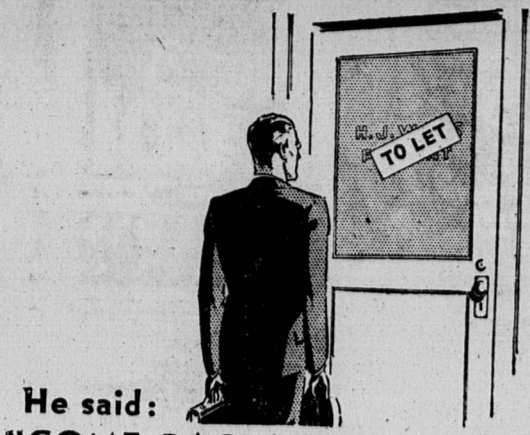

Tariff Duties Will Continue

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Oct. 22.—Great Britain's 33 1-3 percent tariff duties imposed under the recent general tariff act will be continued for two more years from October 25, it was officially announced today. The immediate object of the duties, it was stated, have been to a great extent achieved as evidenced by the fall of imports. For the third quarter of 1932 imports dropped 45 percent as compared to the same period in 1931, the announcement said. Nevertheless "the menace of uneconomic foreign competition continues and is serious."

THE MARCHIONESS TROTS IN 1.59%

LEXINGTON, Ky., Oct. 22.—In an effort to beat her own record of 2.00 The Marchioness this afternoon lowered the world's record for three-year-old trotting fillies to 1.59%, the mile also equalling the

world's record for three-year-old trotters held by her full brother, Protector, 3, 1.59%. The filly was driven by her trainer, William F. Caton of Syracuse, N. Y., who also trained and drove her brother, Protector, to his record. The new champion is the property of Mrs. Ralph R. Keeler of Auburn, N.Y.

SAVES BEE-KEEPERS WORK

A new method of detecting preparations for swarming in bee colonies is reported on by the Superintendent of the Dominion Experimental Station, Lennoxville, Que., who says: "Searching queen cells, by taking out every comb of brood, is a tedious task to obviate such a procedure an experiment was started five years ago. When the colonies show any signs of congestion in the spring, a shallow super is placed on the brood chamber with no queen excluder, so that the queens have free access to this second brood chamber. When examining the colonies, it is a good idea to tip the super from the rear and note if queen cells are present along the lower edges of the combs of the super."
