French Troops Open Attack On Axis Forces



Enemy Admits Soviet Troops On Offensive

MOSCOW, Nov. 19 (AP)—The Russians announced tonight that the Germans had suffered a severe defeat at the town of Orsk, which lies strategically at the top of the important Georgian Military Highway running southward through the Caucasus mountains.

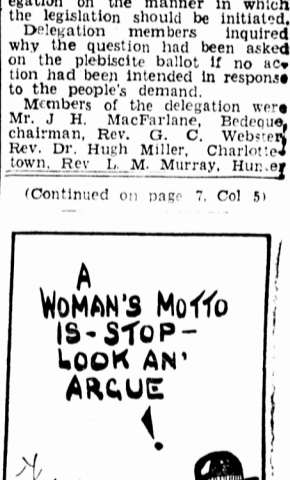
Mrs. John Watts, Hampshire Dead In 91st Year
