

# Crystals Trim Maple Leafs 4-1

## Monctonians No Match For Speedy Islanders, Who Are Now Tied With Central Section League Leaders.

With four neat goals, two from Gauthier's stick unassisted and two by Chick Gallant on passes from Montgomery, Summerside Crystals defeated Moncton Maple Leafs to the tune of 4-1 in a Central League fixture played here last night. Moncton's lone tally was made by Gaudette after Boudreau took the puck up from the face off in the second period.

Crystals are now tied for first place with Amherst, winners of the Amherst-Sussex game played in Amherst last night. LeBlanc, Moncton defence man was one of the fastest players on the ice and turned in a wonderful game. Jack Schurman's pokechecking had the Maple Leafs puzzled and in the first two periods they were forced to content themselves with following in on long shots at Eady.

One of the prettiest plays seen this season came in the second period when Montgomery stickhandled his way to the Moncton blue line and passed over to Chick Gallant, who came right in on the Moncton net and slid the wafer past Lutz who had no chance to save. Four minutes later the pair repeated the play for another goal. Gauthier turned in a fast game and his counters came on two nice individual plays.

In the third period with Wheaton in the cooler, White took the whole play for some two or three minutes.

The Crystals were without Ralph Silliphant, who will not be able to play for about two weeks on account of injuries received at the last Sussex-Crystal game here.

After seventeen minutes of listless play in the first period, Gauthier made the first counter unassisted, a pretty goal. Moncton evened the score from the face off in the second period, when Boudreau beat the Crystal lineup with tricky stick-handling and placed the puck in front of Eady. Gaudette poked the rubber in before Eady could clear. Half way through the period, Monty and Chick combined to make the second Crystal goal and four minutes later followed with the third. Gauthier made the fourth counter four minutes after the face off in the third period, when he unexpectedly shot the puck from in front of the Moncton blue line. The low shot skipped over Lutz's stick. Moncton tried hard for goals for the balance of the period and Eady was given lots of chances to display some spectacular goal tending.

The first period was fast. MacMillan scored on a great solo effort. He went right through Lund scored another for the Queens on a shot from the blue line. A face-off occurred in front of the goal, "Pud" Whitlock securing the puck and netting Levin's third marker. A minute later, Burgoyne made a great save on Johnston who accepted a pass at centre and, catching the Levins forwards flat footed in Queen's territory, coasted in on the Levin's goalie. Acorn then soloed to Burgoyne, who had no chance to save. Holman was penalized. The bell ended a fast game, 7-4 for Queens.

HALIFAX, N. S., Jan. 13.—The official standing of the Nova Scotia Eastern Hockey League was still up in the air tonight. About the only certainty in the situation, following New Glasgow's dropping out, was that the Truro Bearcats, undefeated, were out in front. M. Hamilton, Secretary of the League, has issued a statement that "change of schedule cannot affect standing of teams, as Truro has won all games and Halifax has won all games played against Kentville to date. Standing of teams will be decided on new schedule, commencing Monday, January 18th. If game played last Friday night in Halifax between Truro Bearcats and Halifax affects standing of any team, it will not be counted."  
This was interpreted by observers here to mean that all games previous to the start of the new schedule would be thrown out, but it is probable a meeting of the League executive will be called to straighten the matter out.  
Counting games played with New Glasgow, Truro has won 10, lost none and drawn none. Halifax has won six, lost four and drawn none. Kentville has won one, lost seven and drawn one.

The Following Are the Official League Statistics to Date in the Maritime N. H. L.

MONCTON, N. B., Jan. 18.—Monty Muckle, rangy right winger of the Moncton Hawks, forged to the head of Senior Northern Hockey League scorers last week and now holds a four point margin over Aubrey Webster. The little Fredericton right lane man is in second position, one point ahead of his left flank mate, Sammy McManus.

Muckle has 13 goals and five assists to his credit in a total of 13 games, and incidentally is the cleanest player in the cycle, having yet to draw a penalty. Webster has 11 goals and three assists for 14 points while McManus has notched up half a dozen counters and given seven assists for 12 points.

The figures were released here today by A. M. LeBlanc, official league scorer, and reveal that the Hawks have the leading scorer, the cleanest player and two of the "top bad men" of the cycle.

Bill Gill, huge local barrier man, heads the penalized list with 46 minutes, while Norm Cook, flashy centre, is only three minutes behind Gill.
