NOTHING TO SAY. So far as THE GUARDIAN can learn no public reference was made in any of our city churches on Sunday last to the very aggressive and flagrant official violation of the Sabbath one week previous. We deeply regret and deplore this silence. We regret it on behalf of the day of rest thus lawlessly invaded. We regret it on account of pastors and churches whose silence will inevitably be construed into consent and condonation for what was done. We regret it for our own sake, missing as we do the support on which we had counted with all confidence and trust in this matter.

We regret it for the misconception that will hereafter be placed upon the attitude of influential religious bodies. The Presbyterian church, the Methodist church and the Baptist church have hitherto stood forth as champions of the cause of Sabbath observance. Their leading churches and pastors are here in this city of Charlottetown. Here occurred some conspicuous acts of that most aggressive and wide-spread violation of the Sabbath ever witnessed in Canada. What was done was done with the full knowledge of the pastors and churches referred to. And they have nothing to say on the subject! Hundreds of the members of their congregation waited for them to speak, but they are silent. We deeply regret it.

We search in vain for reasons that will satisfy. Surely it cannot be that the offenders were too influential to be publicly dealt with. The spirit that dared to say to King David, "Thou art the man!" that dared to say to King Herod, "It is not lawful," cannot be altogether wanting to the churches in our day. If that spirit is indeed altogether wanting we regret it most deeply. Can it be that our pastors and churches think that what was done before the sight of the people of four Provinces on the 6th instant was a trivial thing? If so, what are we to think of all that we have been taught from Sabbath to Sabbath in Church and Sunday school regarding the sacredness of the day of rest? Can it be that the offences of the rich the great and the

powerful are to be passed by in silence, while the minor faults and failings of ordinary mortals shall be censured from the pulpit Sabbath after Sabbath? If so we deeply regret it. Can it be that our churches are to be given over to a sickly sentimentalism, to taking "the line" of least resistance, trimming sails to catch the popular breeze, and with no longer a voice to denounce wickedness in high places? If so we deeply regret it. THE GUARDIAN has taken its stand against the action of that fateful Sunday, strong in sense of duty which bade us denounce the wrong. We are not shaken in that conviction by the fact that down to the hour of this writing we have not received one word of support or commendation from any city pastor. We thank those pastors and elders who from other parts of the province have either privately or in a publication sent us the evidences of their appreciation. We believe, indeed, that the heart of this Sabbath-keeping Island is sound on the question at issue, and this makes us the more regret the ominous silence of the spiritual guides in this City.

We have felt that THE GUARDIAN could not afford to be silent on this matter. And we feel most strongly that our pastors and congregations cannot afford to be silent. We still think they will be compelled to speak, either to condemn or to condone what has been done, or to explain a silence which has become painful to many members of the various congregations. We are not complaining; we are content to stand alone, if needs be; we have no desire to lay down a course for those who ought to be wiser
