GOOD RACES YESTERDAY DESPITE RAINY WEATHER

Over Three Thousand Were Present at the Annual Montague Meeting - Brenton H., Baby Todd and Miss Louanda Were the Winners.

The Montague races, which are the annual big sporting event for King's County and are of interest to the whole province, were held yesterday afternoon.

Montague has always been famous for the way it caters to its guests and the track and boarding houses put up appetizing meals which did much to make the day a pleasurable one for the visitors.

The track was in good shape yesterday and the races were very good, although the fact that two of them were won in straight heats robbed them of the uncertainty which makes the sport so appealing to the onlookers.

This was the second race on the program and had four starters. It was a good contest, going to the limit of five heats before it was finally won by Baby Todd, owned by Mr. P. S. Brown, landed second place after a vigorous drive.

Notwithstanding the intermittent down-pours of rain, punctuated by a few showers on the side, and very little sunshine, the Maritime Field and Track Championships held at the Abegweit Athletic grounds yesterday, were in a measure successfully carried out.

Although no Maritime records went by the boards, the time and distances in the different events were very good considering the heavy condition of the track and grounds.

The Meet, which was scheduled to commence at 1:30 had to be postponed on account of the inclemency of the weather, but with the clouds clearing somewhat, it was decided to hold the games at 2:30 sharp.

There was a fair attendance, among whom were His Lordship, the Bishop of Charlottetown, His Worship Mayor Jenkins, Rev. Fr. R. McKenzie, Rev. Fr. L. Smith, and Rev. Fr. Gillis.

Among the number of notable athletes competing at the meet yesterday were Charlie Gorman, of St. John, N.B., present quarter-mile world's skating champion; "Zan" Miller, Sussex, N.B., Canadian high jump champion; Victor McAulay, internationally known long distance runner; Phil McDonald, Charlottetown, champion Maritime broad jumper; Michael Thomas, a former Marathon runner and winner of a number of long grinds was also on the grounds, and an interested spectator of all the events, especially the five mile run, which had two competitors, McAulay and H. Campbell, won by the former in 27 minutes and 53 seconds.

Business Dead in Russia (Associated Press) LONDON, Aug. 29.—South Russia at present offers no golden opportunities for American business men, according to John H. Lang, of Seattle, who recently passed through this city on his way home after 18 months in Odessa and other Black Sea ports, where he was in charge of port operations for the American Relief Administration.

"There is practically no trade on the Black Sea," said Mr. Lang. "Even Greek and Armenian traders have given up in despair, and everyone who knows the Black Sea realizes that when these traders find unsurmountable obstacles to commerce, there must be something serious the matter."

"The new economic policy of the Soviet was heralded as a long expected loosening of government control, and when it was inaugurated more than a year ago the people had great hopes that a new era was dawning in communistic Russia. But such hopes were soon dashed."

"After shopkeepers had opened their stores with what little stocks they could get, they found that the government officials were waiting only for trade to be resumed to impose ruinous taxes. These taxes made business impossible for shopkeepers, for importers and exporters alike."

Harvest prospects in South Russia are excellent, according to Mr. Lang, who said that nobody in Russia should go hungry this winter.
