FAMOUS POCKET CHRONOMETER

(By The Canadian Press) NANAIMO, B. C., April 17—A 10 jewel pocket chronometer made 100 years ago by the famous English watchmaker John Arnold, is in possession of Joseph Brown here. John Arnold was born in Bodwin Cornwall, in 1784. At the age of 30 years he was the smallest watch ever made at that time and being the diminutive timepiece in a ring which he presented to King George III. The King gave Arnold 500 guineas for the gift. The car of Russia, hearing of the tiny watch, offered Arnold 1000 guineas for a duplicate. The offer was rejected.

Women, Their Past and Future

(By The Canadian Press) TORONTO, April 17—Now that women have scaled the crazy hillside and reached the plateau above what are they going to do about it? This was the question put by Colonel Henry C. Osborne, O.M.G., of Ottawa, addressing the Women's Canadian Club here on "Women: Their Past and Their Future." "Will they merely adjust themselves to things as they are and drift along, or will they show the men there is a better way to run the world?" asked the speaker, who as assured Eve "this is a man's world," through Hebrew, Greek, Roman and more recent civilizations, until the present day. It took the Great War with its myriad calls for service, he said, to finally dispel the "myth of woman's weakness and inferiority," and to prove to the world, beyond all doubt, her nobility, strength and courage.

To day, women have achieved, in English-speaking countries at least, complete equality in civil, political, economic and social life. Colonel Osborne stressed his opinion, however, if women are to take their destined places as leaders, they must press forward and seek the wider spheres of knowledge, because "education is the key to opportunity," and that they must also strive for world peace, "because peace is the civilization," means to progress and betterment. Mrs. C. D. H. MacAlpine, President of the Canadian Club, was in the chair, and thanked the speaker, who was introduced by Dr. Peiham Edgar.
