VANCOUVER TO SHIP THE HINDUS

To Ottawa With Her Compliments; Mayor Bethune Puts Up \$100 and \$1500 Is Subscribed; Boycott For Those Employing Asiatics.

VANCOUVER, B. C. Sept. 13 (Special)—With a subscription list started on Tuesday headed by Mayor Bethune with \$100 and which up to Wednesday night had grown to \$1,500, Vancouver citizens will charter a train, and, placing 800 Hindus who arrived on Tuesday by the steamer Montangle on board, will ship them to Ottawa.

SAYS RUSSIANS STOLE ALASKA

Friend Of Tolstoi Now In Winnipeg Has Documentary Proof That Russia Forged Evidence Of Early Occupation On Pacific Coast

WINNIPEG, Sept. 13 (Special)—Leo Nabokeff, a friend of Court Leopold Tolstoi, who is armed with a mission to the wandering Doukhobours, has unearthed some ancient Russian documents in Alaska which materially affect Canada's position in the Alaska boundary question.

ENGLISH AIRSHIP IS SUCCESSFUL

Military Dirigible Balloon Easily Navigated Against a Fifteen-Mile Wind Completes Three-Mile Circle at Height of Half a Mile

FARNBOROUGH, England, Sept. 12.—The first military dirigible balloon built in this country made two trial trips today and, with the exception of a slight hitch caused by the breaking of a belt in the machinery that drove the cooling fan, the airship appears to have answered all the expectations of its inventors.

SAYS AUTOMOBILES DESTROY ROADS

Blow Dust off The Roads and Loosen The Stones.

TORONTO, Sept. 12.—City engineer Rust says that automobiles for destroying the roads and says they should be specially taxed. He says the covering of dust which protects the roadbeds is blown off by the automobiles, and the stones are loosened by the tires.

NO CITIZENSHIP FOR THE ALIENS

ITHACA, N. Y. Sept. 11.—Justice Miller in opening the September term of the supreme court here today surprised the court attendants by refusing all applications for citizenship.

"We have admitted too many ignorant foreigners to citizenship already," he said. "I do not propose to admit to the franchise any person who does not know enough about the constitution of the country to cast an intelligent ballot. I will not grant citizenship papers to any immigrant who has not a fixed intention of staying in the country and an intelligent knowledge of and patriotic interest in its form of government."

HARVARD MAKES A FAST TRIP

BOSTON, Sept. 11.—The new turbine steamer Harvard of the Metropolitan Steamship Company arrived from New York yesterday, having accomplished the voyage in 14 hours and 52 minutes, one of the fastest runs ever made along this section of the coast.

There was a number of minor delays, including a slight mix-up with some barges in Hull Gate last night and fog and head tides on Vineyard Sound.
