Latest News of the City and Province.

A little island, called Aarland, off the coast of Norway, had a population of over 100 persons, thirty families in all. The men were fishermen. Last spring the first death in eleven years took place—a man fell from a cliff. He was taken to the main land for burial, and all the men went to the funeral. Returning their boat was swamped in a heavy sea, and every one drowned, leaving thirty widows, and all but two with families. It is now known as the Island of Widows, and aid is being extended to the families by the Norwegian government.—Ex.

Her funeral which took place on the following day was an occasion to be remembered. It was not so much a season of tears as a season of calm resignation. The grief that she was gone was subdued by a sense of gratitude, that she had been spared so long. Lament we may and must when such a loving friend has departed. But our grief is not without consolation, for when a blameless and beautiful life amid all the sweet consolations of home family and friends has calmly ended in peace, victory and glory, there is no permanent lodgment for pain and sorrow. The funeral service was conducted by the Rev. Malcolm Campbell assisted by the Rev. D. McLean whose prayer on the occasion was one which for its fervor and grace made a deep impression on those who heard it.

BABY OF ONE POUND WEIGHT.

Its Mother's Wedding Ring Worn for a Bracelet.

Miss Carrie Elizabeth Clohessy, five weeks old, weight twenty ounces, even though she is the smallest living baby of her age in New York or perhaps any other city, is as lively as an infant twice her age and twenty times her weight. Her parents are proud of the fact that physicians say she is the smallest human being on record, but it is evident that Miss Carrie resents the suggestion, for when the learned men have come to the home to make scientific observations she has yelled lustily.

Carrie's mother is a pretty woman of twenty, and her father, John Clohessy, is twenty-five. The Clohessys, live at No. 245 Lorimer street, Brooklyn. When their baby was born every one said that she would die. She weighed only one pound then and was very weak and thin. But the baby grew and thrived.

Mr. Clohessy proudly exhibited her little baby yesterday to Dr. Wright and Dr. Ellison, of the Long Island Hospital. The child is perfectly formed. Its legs are no bigger than the little finger of an ordinary-sized man, and its arms are the size of a lead pencil. Its hands and feet are in proportion. The mother took her wedding ring from her finger and slipped it over the child's hand and up its arm to its shoulder. A small-sized teacup fitted over its head like a mask.

The child's head is covered with black hair several inches long. The physicians marvelled at the healthy condition of the child, and for the next month will pay daily visits to the mother and her infant. They say heretofore no infant in medical records who weighed one pound at the time of birth has lived and was healthy.
