—GOOD ROADS.—The public roads still continue to be in the best of condition for hauling, the order of the day is the hauling of ice, mussel mud and wood, and every available team seems to be engaged at this work. Teams with a single sleigh in tow bring on the ice, each trip, wood, measuring as much as two hundred cubic feet. This wood, of which there is a great demand, is being brought up to supplement the coal shortage.

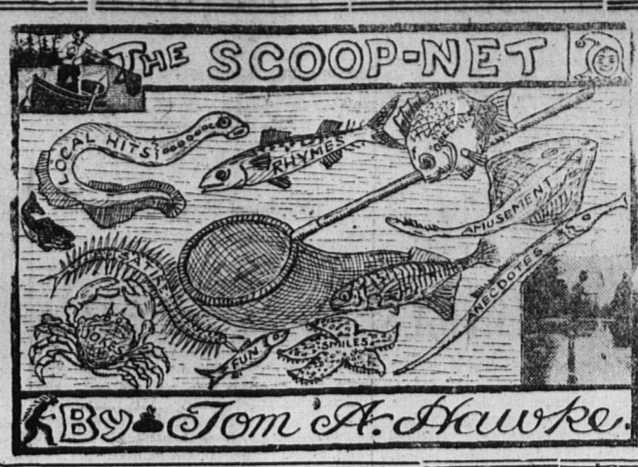

—TOWN COUNCIL.—The first regular meeting of the Town Council of the town of Kensington, was held Thursday evening in the Council Chamber, Mayor Jardine presiding. Councillors present were: Alexander Casley, James B. Proffit, T. W. Bentley, Dr. A. Lockhart, Andrew Bonness and Wesley Champion. Minutes of the last regular meeting approved. Mayor Jardine made the opening remarks asking for punctual attendance on the part of the members of the Council and for the same harmonious deliberations which had characterized their proceedings in the past years. The Council then proceeded to the appointment of the following committees: Finance, Councillors Lockhart, Bentley, Proffit, sidewalks, Bonness, Casley, Champion, street cleaning, Bonness, Champion; fire department, Bentley, Proffit, Lockhart; electric light, Champion, Bentley, Proffit, police and property, Bonness, Bentley. On motion of Coun. Bentley seconded by Coun. Casley James Frederick Proffit was appointed a Stipendiary Magistrate at a stated salary and clerk, Auditors, A. L. Rogers and Alfred Glover; assessors, Wm. Geo. Simpson and Wm. S. Hogg; fire chief, Willard Warren. On motion H. R. Moosa was appointed policeman until a further regular officer be appointed for the town. The matter of engaging a regular policeman was then brought up. On motion it was agreed that the police committee make a canvass of the local business places for monetary assistance for the support of a permanent police officer for the town. The matter of electric lighting for the railway station and the construction of a wider permanent platform from the station house to Broadway Street, also a watchman for the railway crossing on Broadway Street, was then discussed by the Council as a whole. It was ordered that all correspondence and memorials regarding the same be placed before the Council at its next regular meeting with a view to having the matter finally disposed of. The Mayor then ordered the finance committee to be prepared to submit a budget of the expenditures for the coming year after which the Council adjourned.
