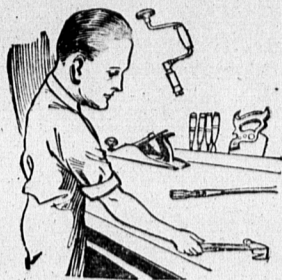

The Passing Of "Old Dobbin"

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 3.—(By the Canadian Press)—The rapid progress of the truck and tractor in taking the place of the horse is shown in the decrease in the number of horses in the last decade. Ten years ago there were 3,610,494 horses in Canada, while at the end of that period there were 3,295,000, showing a decrease of 315,494, or more than 30,000 per year.

The rapidly with which the truck is coming into favor is shown by the increased number of trucks now in use. At the beginning of the period there were about 55,300 trucks at the end of that time. The truck has proved to be a boon, not only in the city, where it is used for the delivery of all commodities, but also in the rural parts, where the farmer hauls his produce to market in a truck, where formerly one or more horses were used.

The passenger car has also made rapid strides in the past ten years, for no more does the family man have to go to the trouble of hitching "Old Dobbin" to the two or one seated buggy, as the case may be, but he merely goes to the garage and steps on the starter of his automobile. For, according to the latest statistics the motor driven vehicle is fast supplanting the horse in family life as well as commercial life in Canada.

At the beginning of the decade there were 465,378 cars, or one car for every 19 persons in the Dominion, while the latest figures available give a total of 1,239,889 cars, or seven persons to each car.

Many Accidents In United States On New Year's Day

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2.—Heavy holiday traffic killed 100 victims, and accidents associated with new year's day observance in the United States accounted for a score more of lives.

Highways of nearly every state and skyways of the midwest alike were charged with fatalities in the rising list of dead last night. Burns, falls, a freak cave-in, hunting and even a coasting accident swelled the fatal totals.

The midwest appeared to be the heaviest sufferer in traffic tragedies. In Illinois nine persons, six of them children, were drowned as their motor car fell 22 feet into the Calumet River while they were en route to a holiday celebration.

An aeroplane mishap brought death to four passengers at Springfield, Ohio. At Waterloo in the same state three men lost their lives when a cave where a party was being held collapsed.

Michigan counted ten dead, seven alone in the Detroit metropolitan area, as a consequence of traffic accidents which injured more than 100 persons.

Auto-train collisions edged into the holiday picture claiming four young people at a Philadelphia suburb.

In the midwest two died of accidental falls while celebrating, one of injuries in a fist fight. Two were injured by stray bullets.

Armour Wins

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 3.—Tommy Armour of Detroit burned up 72 holes of the Miami Springs course for a 285 to win first money in the \$2,500 Miami open golf tournament. Armour had rounds of 75 and 71 in the 36 hole finals today, which added to his previous 36 hole total of 139 gave him a record low score for the Miami event and \$800 prize money.

Toronto Gives Yale Licking

NEW YORK, N. Y., Jan. 3.—The University of Toronto gave Yale hockey team its first defeat in more than a year last night, winning their annual international clash at Madison Square Garden 4 to 0.

Urged To Write To Defend Faith

MADRID, Jan. 3. (A.P.)—Catholics of Spain were urged to unite in defense of the faith in a New Years pastoral letter issued yesterday by members of the high Spanish clergy who took occasion to launch a vigorous protest against the new Spanish constitution.

That document, they asserted, "denies the church the ordinary rights granted to citizens." The signers, including two Cardinals, seven archbishops, 49 bishops and two vicars urged that Catholics participate actively in civil and political life to defend the rights of their faith.

Those who marry without the sanction of the Church will be deprived of the benefits of the church, the pastoral letter said, directing this act at the intervention of the state in matrimonial matters and divorce. The letter also insists that Catholics defend the right of the Church to educate the children of the faithful, in the face of establishment of state control over education.
