ORGAN GRINDER DIES WEALTHY

NEW ROCHELLE, August, 4.—After having ground out his favorite hymns, "Rock of Ages" and "Jesus Lover of My Soul," more than a million times, Melcher Wideman, believed to be the wealthiest organ grinder in the United States is dead. For twenty-eight years he played at the entrance to Glen Island, John H. Starin's summer resort, at New Rochelle. It is estimated that during that time he collected from \$50,000 to \$75,000 in nickels and pennies. The music was so popular that several times an effort was made to force the old man to change his location, but he had a license from the city, and as he was on city property, he refused to leave.

Although Wideman was blind he knew when a crowd was approaching him, and as each car and boat unloaded its passengers at Glen Island he started his wheezy old organ in motion and the result was invariably a shower of coins. It is said that in the busy season the aged man averaged \$25 a day.
