Says Gov't Policies Led To Price Advances

OTTAWA, Jan. 22 (CP) - John Bracken, Progressive Conservative leader, charged tonight that Government policies had made it possible for speculators and profiteers to increase food prices in Canada.

Mr. Bracken said that when Parliament met last month the Government announced that new food contracts at higher prices had been signed with Britain.

Some two weeks after the session adjourned Agriculture Minister Gardiner disclosed the new prices and it was shown they were about 25 per cent higher than in the previous contracts.

"The Government had announced that prices would be increased," said Mr. Bracken. "But it was many days before it told what the increased prices would be. Are any of us surprised when the speculator and the profiteer that some people took advantage of it?"

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St. Laurent Makes Plea For Unity

Chief Justice Heads Provincial Committee

WINNIPEG, Jan. 22 (CP) - External Affairs Minister St. Laurent tonight made a strong plea for national unity through practical application of constitutional law. Earlier, he indicated to reporters that he was prepared to accept future leadership of the national Liberal Party - if it is freely offered him. "The unity about which I am talking is not the kind shown on the statute books but the kind which makes every Canadian glad he is a Canadian," he said in a speech to the annual convention of the Manitoba Liberal Progressive Party. "National unity is possible and desirable only if all our citizens, descended from the two principal races of our population, and our other citizens as well, enjoy a situation of absolute equality, equality not only in the text of our constitutional laws but practical equality in the daily application of these laws." His address was the first delivered in Western Canada since he was elected to Commons by Quebec electors in February, 1942. No direct reference to his possible candidature for Federal leadership was made in his speech tonight although political observers considered it significant that he spent considerable time discussing the growth of Liberalism under Sir Wilfrid Laurier. In this connection Mr. St. Laurent said: "I am not the one who is trying to wrap Laurier's mantle about him. It is the whole Liberal Party, from one ocean to the other, that is proud to be enfolded in this mantle because we all realize that as long as we remain faithful to the memory and policies of this great Canadian we will be wisely and usefully tending to the best interest of the Canadian nation." Then he added: "I think the Liberal Party made one of the first great steps (in the direction of national unity) when it chose Wilfrid Laurier, a French-speaking Catholic, as the leader of all the Liberals from the Atlantic to the Pacific."

Actress Given Prison Term

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 22 (AP) - Film actress Madge Meredith, her appeal for probation denied, was sentenced today to five years to life in Tehachapi Women's Institution on her conviction of kidnapping and assault.

Miss Meredith, appearing sprightly and untruffed in a gray-tailored suit, displayed no emotion as sentence was pronounced.

She was convicted of engineering the kidnapping and beating of restaurateur Nick Gianacis, her former adviser, and who claimed he was instrumental in getting her started on a film career.

A similar term in San Quentin Prison was given Albert Tucker, her friend who allegedly carried out the plot.

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Will Balance Russian Bloc In The East

Bevin Speaks As Foreign Affairs Debate Begins In British Commons.

LONDON, Jan. 22 (CP) - Foreign Secretary Bevin today bluntly accused Russia of a "ruthless drive to annihilate all the privilege of visiting Canadian military establishments because similar privileges have not been accorded the Dominion's military attaché in Moscow, it was announced tonight. This change of policy was disclosed in a Joint Defence Department-External Affairs statement announcing a proposed visit by foreign military attaches to the big artillery camp at Shilo, Man., next week which said that no Russian representative would be included in the 11-man inspection group. The group includes nine military men representing foreign governments but does not involve any of the countries under the Soviet sphere of influence. The statement said that "in accordance with the principal of reciprocal treatment, it now has been decided that the Soviet attaché will not be invited to visit military establishments in Canada unless similar privileges are extended to the Canadian military attaché in Moscow. "When the Soviet authorities grant facilities to the Canadian military attaché in Moscow similar to those hitherto granted to the Soviet representative in Can-

Year's Sentence For Posing As U. S. Citizen

BANGOR, Me., Jan. 22 (AP) - Albert Harding, 60, of Greenwich, P.E.I., was sentenced by Judge John Clifford when he pleaded guilty today to "falsely representing himself as a United States citizen."

Harding, a one-time resident of Malden, Mass., last entered the United States at Vanceboro, Me., in 1945 and was apprehended in Hanover last month while working as a woodman, immigration officials said.

May Import U. S. Cars On Quota Basis

OTTAWA, Jan. 22 (CP) - Importation of American-made automobiles, now banned under Canada's dollar-saving program, may be permitted under a quota basis within two weeks, a source close to the import administration said tonight. The ban came in last November. The spokesman said tonight no date had been set as yet for the quota system.

Funeral Ship Is Still Smouldering

BOSTON, Jan. 22 (AP) - Coast Guard headquarters said tonight the cutters Bibb and Acushnet are battling 65-to-70-mile-an-hour winds in their attempt to remain alongside the still-smouldering United States Army transport Joseph V. Connolly 770 miles east of Boston.

The Connolly was swept by fire while transporting 5,000 coffins overseas to bring home war dead. Her crew of 45 and one passenger were saved.

U. S. Congress Deaf To Alarming Reports

WASHINGTON, Jan. 22 (CP) - A responsible official with access to the United States Government's most secret conferences, talking off the record the other night, said the War Department had information that would "scare the daylight" out of congressmen.

Probably he was exaggerating a little and perhaps he was not reading the newspapers, listening to the radio or attending congressional hearings.

Congress has been hearing a great deal from the Defence Department and from experts of all kinds that, if they were not hardened to such things, should scare them into urgent, non-political action.

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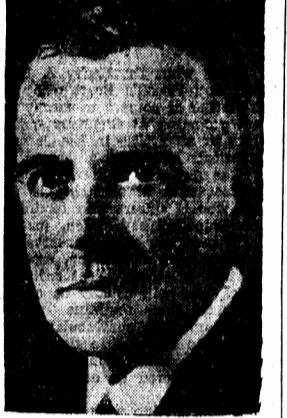

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There is little likelihood that in this presidential election year Congress will be stampeded into doing

anything approaching what the occasion demands, no matter what they hear from the Pentagon Building.

If both parties in Congress agreed to do what the overwhelming evidence indicates they should do this year, they would have to restrict election campaigning to minor domestic issues or decide the outcome by the toss of a coin.

Congress has been told by the President, State Secretary Marshall and others who are supposed to know about such things, that unless the country spends upwards of \$17,000,000,000 on European aid in the next four years, it might as well be prepared to spend far more and also sacrifice American lives in a third world war.

That's pretty grim stuff coming from such high authority but
