RED CROSS APPEAL.

Charlottetown, P. E. I. December 20th, 1916.
 In accordance with a proclamation by His Honour, the Lieutenant-Governor, a public meeting was held at Charlottetown, on the 16th inst., to take action in response to an appeal made to the Empire at large, by Lord Lansdowne, President of the British Red Cross, for a collection in aid of the Society's funds similar to that taken up last year on Trafalgar Day. This appeal has the support of the Dominion Government and the Canadian Red Cross, and in order that all classes may be given an opportunity to respond, and make up a creditable return, a committee was appointed to further the success of a general meeting of ladies and gentlemen to provide ways and means for collecting for this purpose throughout the province. The proposed meeting will be held on Friday, Dec. 28th at 8 p. m., in the Provincial Building at Charlottetown. Clergymen residing in Charlottetown are requested to send notice of the meeting and its purpose to the clergy of their particular denomination who reside in the towns or rural sections, and to request their attendance, or that of substitutes, so that every section of the Province may be represented. The urgency of the need of assistance to the Red Cross, which under the sorrowful fortunes of war is overtaxed in its widespread sphere of usefulness, calls for prompt, energetic and united action on the part of all classes and creeds throughout the British Empire. Your presence and counsel will contribute very much to the success of the worthy object of the meeting, and you are most respectfully invited to attend. On behalf of the Committee. IN MEMORIAM

SAMUEL SHAW, UIGG.

The subject of this sketch, Samuel Shaw, was born in Uigg twenty-seven years ago. There he grew up until eight years ago he went to Charlottetown and served three years with Mark Wright & Co. When that company suspended business he secured a position with Auld Bros. in which firm he laboured till stricken with typhoid fever. He was taken to the P. E. I. Hospital and skilfully cared for, but succumbed to that dread disease after six weeks hard fight, on December the sixth.

Mr. Shaw was a member of the I. O. O. F., also of the L. O. L. The former Society took part in the funeral services held at the Wright Undertaking Parlors and led by Rev. Dr. Fullerton. His remains were brought to his home in Uigg, and a funeral service was held on the eighth at the Baptist Church, Uigg, led by Dr. McEwen. The members of the L. O. L. officiated at the grave in Uigg cemetery, where he was laid beside his father and mother, who predeceased him. There live two brothers and one sister to mourn their loss. Mr. Shaw was an exemplary young man, well liked by his employers, fellow workmen and friends, all of whom deeply regret his death at the beginning of his young manhood. He was a member of Zion Presbyterian Church, Charlottetown, and lived a consistent Christian life. (Patriot please copy.)

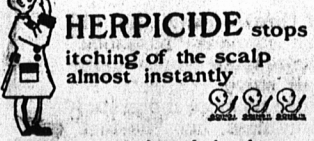
