Black Hawks Score 4-0 Rangers Roar To 3-0 Victory Over Boston To Even Best-of-three Series Third Game Of Series

BOSTON, March 24 (CP)—Chicago's determined Black Hawks demolished their best-of-three game National Hockey League playoff series by overwhelming Boston Bruins 4-0 tonight before a 14,200 crowd at the Boston Garden.

The Hawks, whose chances were discounted when a sinus attack put big Earl Selbert, their outstanding defenseman, out of action, held the opening session hot during the opening session and they exploded a three-goal burst in less than seven minutes during the middle stanza.

Bill Moskowitz opened the Chicago scoring during the fourth minute of that frame by backhanding in a puck after taking Bob Carse's well-aimed pass at the edge of the crease.

Chicago's second and third tallies were registered within seven seconds by Alex Kaleta and Bill Carse the latter scoring from the Blue line.

While the Bruins were attacking in full force during the seventh minute of the finale, Bill Carse intercepted and dashed back with Kaleta and George Allan trailing. They had only the two Boston defencemen trying to backcheck when they crossed the Boston blue line. After fooling these rivals with some beautiful passing, Allan jabbed through goalie Frankie Brimsek for the final score.

No penalties were imposed until halfway through the fourth minute when the be-helmeted Bill Cowley was sent off for five minutes for accidentally causing a head injury to Max Bentley.

NEW YORK, March 24 (CP)—New York Rangers recovering the form that carried them to the National Hockey League championship, tonight routed through a surprisingly - unsteady Toronto Maple Leaf team for a 3-0 victory in the third game of their Stanley Cup elimination hockey series.

The victory left Leafs still a head 2-1 in games, achieved by victories 3-1 at Toronto last Saturday and 4-2 here Sunday. The four game will be played at Toronto Saturday night the fifth here Sunday.

A recovery of form by the line composed of the Colville brothers and Alex Shibicky held the differences between the two teams on the night's play. This trio scored two of the goals by Shibicky and Max Colville while the other went to Allan Kuntz the Ranger rookie whose play was so uncertain in the first two games that the Rangers considered benching him for this game.

Toronto fought hard but all three of their lines which shared the scoring in the first two games found themselves tied up by their opposing players tonight. The young Ranger goalie, Jim Henry of Regina, fully earned the shutout—only the second of his one-season professional career—particularly in the third period when he just got a foot to a snap shot by Johnny McCreedy.

HALIFAX, March 24 (CP)—Dalhousie University swept into the Maritime senior basketball finals here today by defeating Yarmouth 44-27 in the final game of the Nova Scotia championship series. The victory gave them the round by a point total of 77-45. They now play the New Brunswick champions, at Moncton, N.B., for the Maritime title.

The game today was fast and clean, only 10 personal penalties being handed out. Coach Bernie Ralston of the winners led the scorers with 14 points, while Jack MacKenzie of the same team accounted for 10 points.

MONTREAL, March 24 (CP)—Canadiens moved back into definite contention for Stanley Cup honors here tonight when they defeated Detroit 5-0, to even their best-of-three game series at one win apiece.

The teams clashed in the third and deciding game at Detroit Thursday night with the winner qualifying to meet either Boston or Chicago in the semi-finals.

Detroit seemed unable to cope with the continued power drives of the Habitués and although goalie Johnny Mowers was beaten five times he was given little support from his teammates who honored him everything like the form which gave them the series lead.

Canadiens moved in front at 10:03 of the initial period when Pat McKay went off for tripping. Rookie Jim Haggarty broke away from mid-ice and swept in on Mowers to take his own rebound and score.

Sport included Among 'restricted Occupations' by Gov't

OTTAWA, March 24 (CP)—Athletes are likely to have professional ambitions curbed under one of the manpower orders-in-council tabled in the House of Commons today by Prime Minister Mackenzie King.

Sport is included among the "restricted occupations" which may not be taken between the ages of 17 and 45 as new employees unless special permission is granted by selective service officials, or unless the men concerned are medically unfit for military service or have been discharged from the armed forces for medical reasons.

One spokesman tonight interpreted this as prohibiting men now engaged in amateur sport from turning professional if they are within the age limits. It will not affect the status of men now engaged in professional sport.

Seek games for Quebec City ice

MONTREAL, March 24 (CP)—President Norman Dowe of the Quebec Amateur Hockey Association said tonight that the Q.A.H.A. is negotiating with the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association to have some of the games in the Eastern Canadian semi-final hockey series between Glace Bay Miners, Maritime champions, and Quebec Aces, Quebec titleholders, played on Quebec City ice.

The first two games of the best-of-five series are scheduled for Friday, and the remaining games are scheduled to be played in Montreal.

Dowe also announced that Morton engineering, champions of the Quebec City Maritime League, have been awarded the Quebec provincial intermediate title. Morton defeated Montreal Navy, winners of the Montreal National Defence League crown, in the first game of a two-game total-goal series in Quebec Sunday but the Navy team later announced its withdrawal from the playoffs.

Morton will now meet the Ottawa District champions for the right to play the Maritime intermediate champion.

military training and service of farmers, farmers' sons and agricultural workers unless it is established they are not essential to farm production.

5. Prohibition against farm work-ers leaving the farms to take other employment, except to enter active military service in Canada, or for seasonal work in primary industries.

6. A proposal to select single men and childless widowers up to 30 years of age for compulsory training and service in Canada by drawing lots over the whole field of those subject to call and extension of the liability for service to all residents of Canada in the age classes, whether British citizens or not.

7. Provision of free medical treatment for those who have been rejected by the armed forces on physical grounds, providing they undertake to enlist when made fit.

8. Establishment of personnel management classes in co-operation with educational institutions to prepare men for industrial posts in essential industries.

9. A widespread campaign to get women into industry, thus releasing men for war service and employment in essential war work.

10. A national registration to be conducted by all employers under direction of the unemployment insurance commission.

The announcement of the Prime Minister, occupying nearly an hour at the start of today's sitting, was heard by an almost full House and well-filled galleries.

There was no discussion of the announcement but details of the program are expected to be subject to debate on the general war effort as it develops under specific measures now before Parliament.

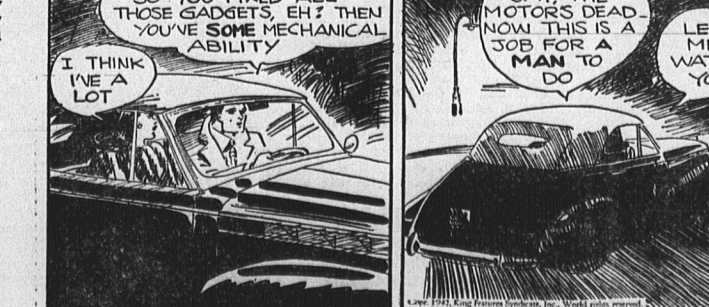
