The Markets

ATHENS, Greece, Feb. 27 - Twenty persons were believed to have been killed today in the collapse of an upper floor of a cafe on University street. Many were injured and a number were still buried in the ruins late this evening.

OTTAWA, Feb. 27 - Eggs - Canadian egg markets all are holding steady today although it is rumored that some U. S. eggs are on the way. United States markets are lower today.

TORONTO - This egg market is firm, but nervous, and it is rumored that some U. S. eggs are on the way. Brokers report sales of Ontario's at extras 49; firsts 47; pullet extras 44, delivered.

MONTREAL - This egg market is holding steady but lower. B. C. eggs are selling on spot at extras 50; firsts 47-48; pullet extras 45. Receipts from Ontario are increasing.

ST. JOHN - The local egg market is very firm with some price advances. Receipts are increasing slightly but are quickly cleaned up. Dealers are paying country shippers for ungraded eggs delivered, cases returned, extras 38-42; firsts 34-38; seconds 27-32.

MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 27 - The trade in car lots of ash grain on spot was of a limited character here today and the market was quiet. In sympathy with the weakness in wheat futures at Winnipeg, spot prices firm.

PRINCIPALS CONDUCT SCHOOL TESTS

They Have Charge of Arrangements for Choice of School Representatives to Districts in Oratorical Contest.

As inquiries have reached The Guardian as to the manner in which the School Contests are to be conducted, we hasten to inform all those interested that there are no rules laid down to govern these.

the city by Messrs. MacRae and Earle. In this connection he was emphatically of the opinion that we should all boost our own manufacturing plants. We did not have enough smoke rising from the factory chimneys of our city. Only by co-operation, and boosting our own industries could we get it.

Councillor MacLeod emphasized the sterling character of the people of our city. It was an outstanding feature - that kindly feeling they have, and the hospitality they extended to the visitors to Charlottetown. He paid a tribute to veterans, expressing his pleasure at being with them that evening.

Col. H. D. Johnson read a telegram from Lorne Stewart and a letter from Herb. Brown expressing their regret at not being able to be present with the veterans that evening. Also one from A.S.B. Mellick, and a telephone message from Fred Wayne, who, on account of the lateness of the mail train at Hunter River was not able to be present.

Col. Johnson went on to explain that, while the banquet was held in honor of all South African Veterans,

prices were reduced 20 per bushel, an easier feeling also prevailed in the local market for spring wheat flour but no price changes were announced. There was no improvement in the demand from English importers for supplies. The movement in winter wheat flour showed no improvement. The local baled hay continued featureless, with business confined to local and country buyers. No export enquiries being received. Prices were steady. The mill-fed market was unchanged.

An easier tone to the egg market was evident when reductions of prices of from 1 to 2c per dozen on the two main lines now selling were announced. The lines were fresh eggs and fresh firsts. Other grades were unchanged, in a wholesale car lot way. British Columbia fresh eggs on spot were also cheaper selling 2c a dozen lower by some dealers. Receipts were 1145 cases.

The potato market was holding steady with a fair trade passing. Prices were unchanged. Butter receipts were 24 packages, and a fair amount of business continued for domestic consumption and for shipment to outside sources. Supplies were ample to meet requirements and no price changes were announced.

An improved demand from local buyers for current receipts of western cheese was noted. Arrivals were light, 40 boxes, and the available supply was somewhat light. The volume of business was small and prices firm.

It was held more especially to commemorate the old originals - the thirty men who joined Company "C" of the R. C. R. From the 12th of February to the 5th of June, these men marched 620 miles from Gaspoint to Pretoria, fighting many general actions, among them Paardeberg, Poplar Grove, Driefontein, Israelport, Houtneck, Lindley, Doornkop, Six Mile Spruit and finally Pretoria. "A" Company had been in every one of these actions, and among these men, there were seven or eight who never we did not have sufficient immigrants coming to us. He hoped that in the years to come we would have coming to us splendid emigrants of the four great stocks mentioned by Mr. MacLure.

Mr. Muir next went on to touch on the beauties of the city of Charlottetown, saying that he did not believe there was any finer city to live in anywhere. He then recalled the circumstances of the declaration of war in South Africa. At that time he was an assistant minister in Glasgow. A great thrill he said, went through the Scottish people when they heard that the Canadians were sending a contingent to the help of the Motherland.

Mr. Leo Bradley, President of the Prince Edward Island Branch of the Canadian Legion in responding to the toast to the legion, described as the biggest British institution exists, and, taking it together with similar bodies in the various all countries, the biggest institution the world. He told of the great tasks, when all the Veteran's organizations in Canada united to form a Canadian Legion.

The principles of the Legion were unity, comradeship, and peace - peace at any price, but peace with honour. In the legion, he said, there was no distinction of creed or party. He expressed the indebtedness of the Canadian Legion to the splendid example set by those who went to the South African War. He commended the Veterans to meet as often as they could, and to foster and cherish the old British bull dog spirit.

Capt. H. R. Stewart responded to the toast of The Ladies. In doing so he said, in selecting him for the task a precedent had been broken, usually one living in the solitude of bachelorhood was chosen. He praised most warmly the women done by the ladies, as nurses, and certain auxiliary services in the war. During the war the stress and strain brought forth a courage and endurance in women as in men - courage in which they faced without qualms both dangers by land and sea, and the shock of bereavement of husbands, brothers and sons, who had fallen in the empire's battles.

In alluding to the film "Daw" which shows forth the heroic sacrifice of Nurse Edith Cavell. But did not name her own title to find a name of such sacrifice. The toast to the Press was responded to by Mr. Charles Mitchell of the Patriot and Mr. E. A. Messervy The Guardian.

In reply to the toast of Our Mothers, Premier Saunders replied eloquently on behalf of Mrs. Lynn the proprietress of the Davies Hotel.

In response to the toast to the Canadian Militia and the Canadian Expeditionary Force. Lt. Col. A. G. Peake and Major T.E. MacNutt were called on to respond.

Col. Peake in the course of his remarks paid a tribute of praise to the South African War Veterans. There were looked on by the veterans of the world war as the spiritual fathers, as it were, of the Canadian Expeditionary Force, since they were the first men to go as a body to take part in the wars of the Empire in foreign lands. And, in the world war, they were the first to enlist, and their mature experience was of great value to the citizen soldiers, many of whom had never fired a rifle.

In closing his address Col. Peake expressed his warm appreciation of the untiring and devoted work of Col. Johnson, Veteran of both wars, in behalf of returned soldiers, their widows and children.

Major MacNutt said that the Canadian Militia had always done its duty. Away back in the American
