**THE PATIENT DOING WELL.**  
Dr. Buller, the eminent oculist, expects to save one eye.  
A similar accident occurred fifteen years ago when both eyes were lost. David Shaw is one of the leading men of his class and he is generally sympathized with.  
At present he is in Royal Victoria Hospital and is doing as well as can be expected.

Some advertisers are using the Inland Revenue Department's recent official report upon baking powders to show the comparative strength and qualities of these articles as they are sold in the Dominion. It is not fair, however, either to the Analysts or to the public in making this use of the official figures that they should be misquoted, as it is alleged has been done in some instances.  
The following figures are copied from the official report printed by the Canadian Government and show correctly, as per that document, the relative strength value of baking powders named. The analyses in all cases were made by the Government Analysts.—

PER CENT. OF AVAILABLE LEVENING GAS.	
"Royal" (average of three highest tests).—	13.4
"Cleveland's" (average of two highest tests).—	13.
"Dearborn's" (average of three highest tests).—	11.7
"Imperial" (average of two highest tests).—	9.9
"Magic" (contains alum.) (average of three highest tests)	7.7

These tests should set the taking powder question at rest.—Montreal Pharmaceutical Journal.

## HEIRS TO SOME \$2,250,000

Death of Isaac Hayden in Honolulu Leaves a Vast Fortune

### INQUIRIES RECEIVED AT THE GUARDIAN OFFICE

The Latest Particulars With Names of Heirs Alleged to Have Been Located by the Boston Post—Proof of Relationship has Been Forwarded and Full Report is Expected from Him in Season.

(Boston Post Feb. 27th.)  
Twenty years ago a young man named Isaac Newton Hayden left his little home at the head of St. Peter's Bay, thirty miles east of Charlottetown, P. E. I. He was imbued with an adventurous spirit, and an inordinate hope to make a fortune in the United States.  
Very little money smuggled in his pocketbook, but he had learned the carpenter's trade and was ambitious.

#### WORKED IN BOSTON.

He worked in Boston for a Charlottetown contractor. Two years later he joined a party that went to the Kootenay district in British Columbia. He had saved his earnings. He believed they would multiply tenfold in the new country of the northwest.  
His companions engaged in mining. Hayden remained true to his trade and made money building houses. Many mining camps of the great copper and gold producing country across the border of Montana and Idaho stand to-day a monument to his energy and thrift.  
But Isaac Hayden was restless. His mind dwelt on the land beyond the Pacific slope. His dreams even extended farther than that. The prospects of a fortune waiting among the verdure-clad isles of the Pacific ocean lured him on.

So he left the rough camps of miners and went to San Francisco. A few days later he was aboard a monster steamship, passing slowly through the Golden Gate bound for the Hawaii Islands.

#### THAT WAS OVER SEVEN YEARS AGO.

Isaac Hayden's dreams came true. There was a fortune waiting for him there. He was quick to perceive its presence, and prompt to begin its accumulation.

There he made use of the trade he had learned in his far-away native land. His hands were skilled in the art of building, his mind was trained to accomplish big results. He was soon recognized as the leading contractor of the city. He secured both government and private work.

He began to realize his dream of fortune. When the Hawaiian government dissolved he revelled in contracts which were executed and paid for by the country of the Stars and Stripes.

He never married. He kept away from matrimonial snares laid for him by cheerful widows and mothers of marriageable girls, who cast favorable eyes on him and his reputed wealth.  
During all these years he never wrote to his brothers or sisters, not because he didn't like them, but because of the trait that is born within every native of the Island of Prince—a trait that prompts an aversion of letter writing.

#### DIED IN A STRANGE LAND.

Then, one day, he died. Kind friends assisted at his bier, but the funeral services were held from an undertaker's rooms in cosmopolitan Honolulu. No relatives were there to shed a tear over the man whose dream of fortune was realized, but whose enjoyment of it was cut off in middle life.

His affairs were left without a head. The National Bank of the government held a princely fortune to the credit of

the dead man's heirs. Queries were sent broadcast over the United States.

Then the Sunday Post staff began to work up the case. Isaac Hayden's native town was located. A brother Douglas was found. Then the other relatives were traced and their heirship to the Honolulu millions undoubtedly established.

James Hayden with his wife lives in a pretty house in Hinckley street, Somerville near Magoun square. He, too is a carpenter and contractor, and very well-to-do.  
With him boards his brother, John Hayden who is employed by the Boston & Maine railroad.

#### FAMILY OF CARPENTERS.

The oldest member of the family, Cyrus Hayden, also a contractor and builder lives in Cleveland, O., and is a prominent business man of that city.

Jemimah wife of Stephen E. Obery of Portsmouth, N. H., is a sister of the dead millionaire.

Another sister, Elizabeth, wife of Frank Powell of Portland, Me., will receive a portion of the millions.

The four pretty daughters of Hannah Churchill, who died several years ago, will each get a share.

The whereabouts of the oldest sister, Mary, is a mystery. Her brothers and sisters don't know where she is. She dropped out of sight years ago, but as no notice of her death has ever come to her relatives, it is believed that she is living.

The Haydens left home as soon as they were old enough to go out in the world to seek their living. Some little correspondence has been maintained among the brothers and sisters who live in New England, but few if any letters passed between them and Cyrus Hayden of Cleveland.

He was in Boston last week for the first time in twenty-eight years. He stopped at his brother's home in Somerville, where a reunion of relatives who had not seen each other for over a score of years took place.

The Hayden heirs have sent proofs of their relationship to Isaac Newton Hayden to the administrator of the millionaire's estate in Honolulu, and a full report is expected from him in due season.

### CONTRACTOR HAYDEN DIES IN HONOLULU LEAVING MILLIONS TO HEIRS.

Isaac Newton Hayden, the well-known carpenter, died about 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon at the home of his friend, Fred Ganzell, on Vineyard, near Fort street, after an illness of a week. Diabetes was the trouble. The funeral will take place at 3 o'clock this afternoon from the undertaking parlors of Henry Williams.

Mr. Hayden was born in Prince Edward Island, forty-eight years ago, and came from one of the best families there. He arrived in Honolulu about seven years ago, bringing excellent letters, and engaged in the business of carpentering. In that trade he was very successful, soon becoming a prominent contractor. One of his contracts at the time of his death was the new Pantheon building at the corner of Hotel and Fort streets.

Deceased was a prominent member of and worker in the First Methodist Church. He left no immediate family, though there are numerous relatives in the East.
