This shows that the matter of marketing, medium farm products through the medium of the dairy cow is essential to agricultural success, since the raw farm products cannot net to the farmer such returns as can be received through the finished products. Bonar Law Enterprising In Mr. Larkin's Opinion

LONDON, Dec 1.—P. C. Larkin, Canadian high commissioner, when interviewed yesterday, said that Bonar Law's intention to call an imperial economic conference shortly showed a broad and enterprising spirit on the part of the prime minister. Such a conference undoubtedly would encourage trade and induce an interchange of manufactured goods and bring Canada into still closer union with the motherland by improving the markets for the produce of her paper mills, lumber trade, orchards and farms. Mr. Larkin emphasized the fact that Canada had taken a lead in promoting inter-imperial trade by giving Great Britain a preferential tariff, but there was room for still further co-operation.

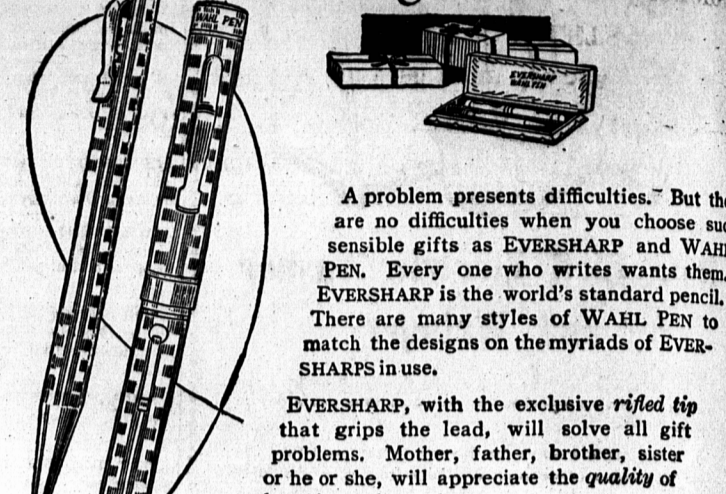
