MURDER MOST FOUL.

Never perhaps was Charlottetown more horrified than when last evening the news spread like wildfire through the streets of the murder of Lillian Warren. People refused to believe the first vague reports until confirmed by the appalling proofs. A worthy young woman, in middle life, supporting her aged widowed mother by her honest toil, she had only left the place where she had been employed and gone about one hundred yards on her homeward way when she was struck down by some fiend in human shape. The horror of it is almost incredible. The coroner's jury who will make inquiry for innocent blood is, we are glad to know, composed of good men. We need not remind them that a greatly shocked community expects and believes that they and the officers of the law will exhaust every means to bring the red-handed murderer to justice.

The Montreal Witness pays a deserved tribute to John Charlton on his retirement from political life. The Witness says among other things: "It is a national misfortune that a voice which was so often raised in parliament in support of truth and virtue, should be heard no more. The influence for good of such a man, in what may be called the formative period of our Canadian national life, was incalculable."

If it is true that James P. Robertson, of the firm of Manchester, Robertson and Allison has become a supporter of the leader of the Opposition, as stated by The Examiner, the incident is of considerable political significance. Mr. Robertson was a very prominent Liberal of long standing, and also a devoted supporter of Hon. Mr. B'air when the latter represented St. John. He seems also to have shared Mr. B'air's views in regard to the Transcontinental Railway. And there are other Liberals who feel the same way.

The Guardian learns that Hon. George Forbes being disposed to retire from the representation of the Belfast District, a number of prominent Liberals in that section are desirous to secure the consent of F. L. Haszard to become a candidate there. Mr. Forbes has represented the District with credit continuously since 1886. Should Mr. Haszard now consent to become a candidate the electors will have the opportunity of securing an able and influential representative whose talents and high character would make him a distinct accession not only to the strength of the party, but to the Legislature as well.

THE LOVING CUP.

We doubt not that the Archbishop of Canterbury fulfils the apostolic injunction with regard to Bishops and is not given too much wine. Still, the presentation of two loving cups, one by a western church and another by the Bishops assembled in the Episcopal Convention in Boston, as noted in our despatches the other day has caused inquiry as to the nature of the loving cup and object of the presentation.

The loving cup, also called the grace cup is described as having both secular and religious uses. It is described as a large cup with two or more handles, which is passed round from guest to guests at state banquets and city feasts. Miss Strickland says that Margaret Atheling, wife of Malcolm Canmore, in order to induce the Scotch to remain for grace after meat devised the grace cup which was filled with choice wine, of which each guest was allowed to drink as much as he chose after grace had been said.

assumed a religious aspect. The monks called the wassail bowl the psalium caritatis (loving cup) a term still retained by the London companies, but in the universities the term "grace cup" is more general. Immediately after grace the silver cup, filled with sack (spiced wine) is passed round. The master and wardens drink welcome to their guests after which the cup is passed round to the guests. So much for the secular side of the subject.

The ceremony of drinking from one cup and passing it round, was observed in the Jewish paschal supper, and our Lord refers to the custom in the words, "Drink ye all of it." We infer that the loving cup presented to the Archbishop were designed for religious and not for secular uses. In any case it is to be observed that total abstinence, even among the clergy, is by no means so common in the Mother Country as it fortunately is in Canada.

The reporter of the Moncton Transcript who wrote up the story of the wreck of the steamer Call appears to have had a bad spell. News of that sort should be credited to "Mr. Faker" and not to Mr. Faqar.
