Brilliant Scenes At Royal Court

(Special to the Guardian) LONDON, June 27.—Four hundred richly gowned young women from many parts of the world filed before Queen Mary in a two hour procession tonight at the third Royal Court of this brilliant social season was held in Buckingham Palace.

As King George is still recuperating from his recent illness, the Queen stood alone in the midst of the great ballroom in front of a single golden throne. She wore a gown of green and gold, a diamond crown, the famous diamonds known as "Lesser Stars of Africa" and the Order of the Garter. The great suite of state rooms, the ballroom, drawing room and picture gallery of the Palace were filled with diplomats, statesmen, soldiers and women in many hued dresses. Yeomen of the guard and gentlemen at arms in their white plumed helmets and scarlet uniforms gave a medieval aspect to the whole scene.

DAWES SCORED

(Special to the Guardian) NEW YORK, June 27.—Ambassador Charles G. Dawes' refusal to wear knee breeches at Queen Mary's Court reception in London last night drew a mild rebuke today from the editorial writer of the New York Graphic. "We believe Dawes would have done a gracious thing by wearing knee breeches," the tabloid asserted. "They are not one whit sillier than the traditional American dress suit with its clumsy pants, hard boiled shirt, choker collar and iron clad cuffs."

JUBILEE OF ST. PETER'S WILL BE CELEBRATED

St. Peter's Cathedral of this city, is to-day celebrating its Diamond Jubilee. The Cathedral was founded sixty years, having been consecrated on St. Peter's Day, June 29th, 1869.

Its establishment was a direct result of the Oxford Movement, initiated in the "thirties" by Newman, Kibbe and Pusey.

The men who were largely concerned in the formation of St. Peter's were the late Bishop Binney of Nova Scotia, Mr. Justice Hodgson, Master of the Rolls and Mr. F. St. Croix Brecken. The first priest incumbent was Rev. George W. Hodgson, who was then Chaplain of the Bishop's. He was followed by the late Canon Simpson, who fulfilled the long ministry of forty-three years here. In the course of sixty years there have only been three incumbents, the present holder of office being Rev. Canon Malone, who came here in 1921.

Yesterday, St. Peter's Day, there was a choral celebration of Holy Communion at 7 a. m., and today there will be a celebration of Holy Communion at 7 a. m. At 8 a. m. the Rt. Rev. John MacKenny, Bishop Co-adjutor of Nova Scotia will administer confirmation to several candidates. At eleven o'clock the chief service of the Festival will be held. It will be a Song Eucharist at which the Rev. Dr. Hunt, Professor of Divinity at King's College, Halifax, will be celebrant. The Rev. Father Turney of the Society of St. John the Evangelist, Bracebridge, Ontario, will be deacon and the Rev. Canon Malone sub-deacon. The preacher will be Dr. MacKenny and the Rev. Cuthbert Simpson will act as ceremoniarus. At 7 p. m. the festival leading song will be sung with a procession and a solemn "Te Deum" before the altar. The preacher at this service will be Father Turney, S. S. J. E.

Rev. Bishop MacKenny arrived on the island a week ago and has been visiting the various island parishes. Father Turney and Rev. Cuthbert Simpson of the General Theological College in New York and Chaplain of St. Mary's Convent Pevecksgill, New York, also have arrived for the occasion.

Very Successful Orphanage Year

Liabilities Decreased By Over \$1500 During Past Year—Assets Increased By \$1000. Trustee Board Selected.

The annual meeting of the Prince Edward Island Protestant Orphanage which was held in St. Paul's Hall last evening revealed a notable strengthening of the finances during the calendar year of 1928 and also a marked increase in donations. Liabilities have been decreased by over \$1500 while assets in the form of a new barn, fire-escapes and other equipment have been increased by \$1000.

CHAIRMAN'S REPORT

Again we gather to give an account of the activities of your Prince Edward Island Protestant Orphanage. For some years now we have been able to note annually steps of progress and improvement and it is with considerable satisfaction that this can again be the case. In spite of difficulties and serious problems advancement has been made, due to the zeal of the public generally in supporting so well the workers of the Institution in every part of the Province.

The personnel of the Board of Trustees has changed from time to time during the year. When vacancies occurred, Committees were appointed to select Ladies or Gentlemen to come in and co-operate with us. We were sorry to lose Mrs. J. B. Profit who for some years was a member of the Board, her place was filled by Mrs. Wright Laird. Mr. R. A. Aitken was not able to act after his election at the last annual meeting, and Mr. W. A. Stewart was asked to join our ranks in his place. Mrs. W. A. Miller found it impossible to attend the meetings and Mrs. W. G. Bruce kindly consented to help us instead. We could not overlook a loss we have sustained of outstanding gravity in the departure of Rev. Ross C. Eaton from our Province and so from our work; he was from the time of his appointment on the Board as Vice Chairman always very interested and active in all the duties placed upon him. Up to the time of writing his place has not been filled.

Our Superintendent, Miss Beers, has exhibited utmost zeal throughout the year. Ever was she ready to
