**HAMBURG, Aug. 16.**—Russia has exported 600,000 tons of grain so far this year according to statistics compiled here whereof Germany has taken over two-thirds. Before the war Russia exported about 8,000,000 tons of grain. The entire exports for this year are estimated between 2,500,000 and 3,000,000 tons.

#### Prison Reform is Now Popular In England

**LONDON, Aug. 16.**—Prison reform is popular just now in England, where it used to be regarded as purely an American notion. The latest thing in prison reform has been adopted in Wakefield Gaol, with excellent results. It is said, the prison, which was closed in 1916, has been reopened as a training centre for adult prisoners. The underlying idea of the training is to teach the prisoners to "play the game." Scarcely a warder is to be seen. To maintain order the prefect system of the English public schools has been adopted. Solitary confinement has been abolished, and there is no restraint on conversation at meal times. The men all have allotments. They work in pairs—a man who knows something of gardening being coupled with a man who knows nothing about it. Every prisoner who does well is allowed to grow a border of flowers to decorate his "room" as the cells are called. There is plenty of work done—nine hours manual, two hours mental. Work is arranged under expert instructors in the weaving shed, foundry, builders yard and other work-shops. One hour a week is devoted to discussion of happenings in the outside world on all topics except crime.

#### Beland Clears Up Veterans' Trouble

**OTTAWA, Aug. 16.**—Hon. H. S. Beland, Minister of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment, made a statement this morning in relation of the petition sent to the government by the Great War Veterans' Association in regard to the dropping of certain sections from the person and reestablishment legislation at the last session of parliament.

"The sections were omitted," said Dr. Beland, "and I do not know how it occurred. But the omissions were not serious. One section omitted," he went on, "gave the appellant the right of access to the files in his case. It is quite within the power of the Minister to allow access to the files without an act of parliament."

"And it will be your policy to grant such access?" Dr. Beland was asked.

"Yes," he replied, "it will be our policy to grant it."

"The other section omitted," he continued, "provided that the successful appellant should have the expenses of his appeal paid. Under the act as it stands, through the Senate made a number of amendments the appellant has the right to have his expenses paid under such conditions as are set by the Governor-in-Council.
