## THE FARMERS CALL FOR EDUCATION IN AGRICULTURE.

The resolutions recently adopted by the Farmers' Institute Convention at Summerside in favor of agricultural education are worthy of serious attention. They also show that our farmers are thinking. Nearly three-fourths of the people of this Province live by farming. Nothing can therefore be of more importance than that those who are to succeed in the present generation should be masters of the farmers' calling—at least so many of them as are to live by tilling the soil.

We may educate our sons for the learned professions, but only a very few hundreds of preachers, lawyers, and doctors are needed in our little Province, and the ranks of these are already full. It follows that those of our sons whom we educate for these callings cannot, except in a few instances, remain in the Island. Thus we are rearing and educating at large cost—not less than \$2,000 each—our young men to send abroad, to give their strength, energy and intelligence to build up other countries than our own.

Prince Edward Island cannot afford this drain. Too long we have followed educational methods that lead and lure our young men away from the land and away from their homes. Too long we have neglected the necessary teaching methods that would make farm life at once attractive and profitable. It is along these lines that the intelligent Prince County farmers have been thinking, and we sincerely hope and trust that their deliberations and resolutions may bear good fruit.

The successful cultivation of the soil, the production of live stock and the products and fruits of the dairy and the orchard, are no longer what they once were, a mere crude and laborious calling, to be followed in a haphazard way. Farming has become a science, and one of the noblest and the foremost. Machinery has relieved it of much of its old time drudgery. Scientific methods applied in intensive cultivation of the soil have demonstrated that ten acres can be made to produce as much value as was produced on a hundred acres by the olden slipshod methods. There is ample room and land enough within our Island shores for a prosperous population of a quarter of a million people.

Intensive farming along practical scientific lines is what is wanted. To that end we must have thorough agricultural education. There is much to be learned in agriculture as in law or medicine, and as much that it is important to know. But hitherto our young farmers have been denied the opportunities to learn in their own Province what the farmers of other lands have learned and are practicing with profit. The Island farmer has had all along to compete with farmers better instructed than he in other lands.

Instruction in agriculture and all that pertains thereto ought long ago to have had a prominent, if not a foremost place in our schools and colleges. It ought to be imparted by teachers and professors who are in love with agriculture. Hitherto such instruction has been largely ignored, or relegated to the back-ground. Too often the teacher has but thinly disguised his or her contempt for the farmers' calling. And yet agriculture was promoted by so great a man as George Washington to be "the most healthful, the most useful and the most noble employment of man."

For even the King is served by the field as Solomon has told us. And Agesilaus, the wise king of Sparta, when asked what it was most desirable that boys should learn, made answer: "That which will be most useful to them when they become

men." Obviously what would be most useful to the great majority of Prince Edward Island boys is a thorough knowledge of that great calling in which they were born and reared and for which they are best fitted. Thus equipped for the battle of life, they will find an interest, satisfaction, dignity and profit in their life calling which few if any other vocations can give.

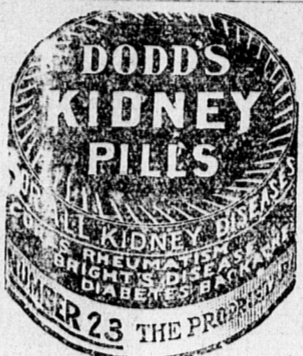

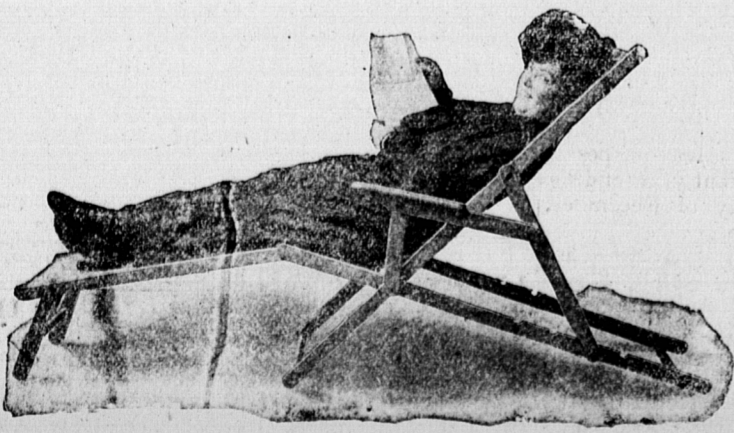
