**A PAINFUL ACCIDENT**—Mr. Clifford Bell, assistant engineer of the tug Sogencendo, which is receiving repairs to her machinery, met with a very regrettable accident on Saturday afternoon. Mr. Bell was engaged at his duties, when his clothing caught in the set screw of the main shaft, as the engine started. He was whirled round by the shaft and but for the prompt action of the chief engineer in stopping the machinery almost instantly. Mr. Bell would undoubtedly have met instant death. As it was, almost all his clothing was torn from his body, his right leg was badly broken below the knee, and he was badly bruised, one toe being so mangled that it had to be amputated. He was removed to the P. E. I. Hospital, after receiving treatment from Drs. Yeo and Ledwell. At last reports he was getting along nicely considering his painful injuries.

**DIED IN TRURO**—The death occurred in Truro, N. S. last week of Mrs. (Capt.) J. W. Daley, after an illness extending over about five months. The late Mrs. Daley, who was in her 48th year was a woman who was very highly respected by all who knew her. Her kindly Christian disposition endeared her to all but it is in the home that she will be missed most. Last November she was stricken with spinal trouble which later assumed a form of sleeping sickness and despite all that the best medical skill could do her condition continued to grow worse. In December she was obliged to take to the bed and since then she gradually sank until the end came. She bore her illness with great patience and was conscious up till her death. Mrs. Daley leaves to mourn a sorrowing husband, three daughters, Jennie, Ida and Sybil—on son, Whitman, all at home. Also two brothers: E. G. Whitman of Louisburg and W. C. Whitman of Beaver Harbor and one sister Mrs. John Cameron, Fox Harbor. About three years ago the family moved to Truro from Beach Point P. E. I.

**SHEEP BREEDERS MEET**—The Directors of the P. E. I. Sheep Breeders' Association met in the office of the Dept. of Agriculture on April 30th. W. H. McGregor of Lot 16 was appointed President, and Albert Boswell Vice-President. The matter of receiving this season's wool and the method of handling it at the grading stations was discussed. It was decided to begin receiving at both Charlottetown and Summerside on June 21st continuing to July 1st, when grading will commence. The usual regulations regarding the tying of fleeces with paper twine will be enforced. Fleeces tied with Binder Twine must be re-tied at the producer's expense. It was further agreed to pay freight charges on all wool shipped by both. It was recommended that if not returned, W. Boulter of the Dept. of Agriculture, Charlottetown was appointed Secretary to take charge of the wool. W. J. Reid, who has lately returned to the Department, and who has charge of the Live Stock work for the Province, suggested several ways by which the sheep industry may be improved. It was considered advisable to acquaint the Sheep Breeders that they may insure Pure Bred Sheep and Lambs for 10 cents each, and grade sheep and lambs for 5 cents each. **POTATOES**—The following is from the St. John's, Nfld. Telegram: "Not a potato to be had in town," is the way that one of our large dealers characterized the situation to the Trade Review yesterday. P. E. I. potatoes arrive next month will be \$5.50 per half sack or \$11 per barrel of 180 lbs. Charlottetown is flooded with buyers from Boston, New York, and as far South as Texas, and the excitement consequently on competitive demand has put prices up to this unprecedented level. The situation is made worse by the fact that the P. E. I. crop last year was a short one. It is predicted that much higher prices will have to be paid before the new crop is available. There are no home grown, worth while offerings. Farmers say they want all they have for seed.

**RECORD PRICE FOR COLT**—The highest price ever reached by a home bred colt in the Maritime Provinces was recently received for "Billy Sharon," 21614, a standard bred four year old, the figure being \$3,500. His sire, Captain Aubrey is the well known standard bred stallion of the Agricultural College farm Truro. It is worthy of note, says the Truro News, that the horse breeders of Prince Edward Island Captain Aubrey's old home, are recognizing his worth. A request has been received from P. E. I. Minister of Agriculture to have him sent back for a time to that Province. Captain Aubrey and other individual sires of note at the College farm constitute an asset to the live stock interest of Nova Scotia of which they may well be proud.

## Outstanding Holsteins

C. E. MacKenzie  
Not long ago I had the pleasure of looking over a stable of outstanding Holsteins at Cleaview Farm owned by H. J. Kennedy Southport. Mr. Kennedy although only a young breeder has the unique distinction of holding perhaps the highest R. O. M. record in the province.

In the nature class Johanna Loitilla of Pownal has a seven day record of 5 1/2 pounds of milk and 24 3/8 lbs. of butter, this we believe is the highest record for any Island bred cow. Again in chic three years old class Cynthia Abbekeik has just finished a week with 524 pounds of milk and 24.82 pounds of Denora IV has an R. O. M. record of 415 pounds of milk and 17.68 pounds butter three months after freshening.

Another splendid heifer in this stable is Queen Elizabeth Kirk bred by E. L. Gill, Burgessville, Ont. This heifer won the first prize in her class, first in the milk test under 36 months and sweepstakes at the provincial exhibition in Charlottetown and is milking well over 40 pounds milk a day almost eight months after freshening. Mr. Kennedy has a daughter of Denora IV and one of Queen Elizabeth Kirk.

Mr. Kennedy while doing R. O. M. work for the present intends starting his whole herd in R. O. P. work when they freshen next autumn and we expect to hear more of them later.  
Mr. Al. Andrew, East Royalty is now the owner of Denora IV and has recently purchased from Mr. Kennedy Pauline Brilly Colantha a very promising 2 year old heifer which may be heard from at Amherst next fall.
