

Three Boxing Titles Won By Local Fighters In Maritime Tourney

At the Maritime amateur boxing championships held at the Charlottetown Armouries Saturday night, the Abegweit Club boxing team walked off with the light weight, paperweight and bantam weight championships, while Amherst, N. S., ran them a close second with titles captured by winners of the featherweight and welter weight honors. Dartmouth, N. S. won the flyweight championship.

R. Reynolds, Amherst won the featherweight title by scoring a second round knockout over Carl "Beau Jack" MacDonald, Charlottetown, while Bob Gallant scored a close decision over Jack Walker to capture the light weight crown. Both boys hail from Charlottetown. The new flyweight Maritime champ is G. VanStone of Dartmouth who scored a 3rd round T.K.O. over Bill Longapelle of Charlottetown, while Willie Dunn, present holder of the P. E. I. bantamweight title, adding the Maritime title to his credit when B. White, Amherst and W. Gallahar, New Brunswick, failed to appear to contest the title. John Stuart, Amherst, captured the welterweight crown by winning a decision over Dave Tuplin, Charlottetown.

Zaky Marshall, representative of Mount Allison Academy in the featherweight division would in all probability have been the new champion except for a tough break. He had to retire from the competition as the result of a badly cut eye after winning the decision over R. Reynolds in the semi-finals. He, with the latter continuing in the finals to defeat Carl MacDonald by a knockout. The Reynolds vs. Marshall fight was the first home on the card and was a thrilling crowd pleasing event all the way.



The Maritime amateur boxing championships went over with much success at the Charlottetown Armouries Saturday night with the Charlottetown Abegweits capturing three of the six Maritime titles at stake. The Amherst team, sponsored by the Nova Nova Scotia Highlanders Sergeants Mess, copying second place with two titles, while the Dartmouth team, sponsored by the St. Peter's Club captured one title to place third.

Although there weren't as many entries as was previously expected with Newcastle, Moncton and Halifax (Wanderers Club) failing to send their teams, the fights that were presented (eight in all) were packed full of action and most of the titles, with the exception of one knockout and one T.K.O. were won on narrow margins with the competition being exceptionally keen in all cases.

The titles which went to the Abegweit Club were the paperweight, light weight and bantam weight, with Willie Dunn, Bob Gallant and Stevie MacDonald, all of Charlottetown, winning the titles respectively. The Amherst Club won the featherweight and welterweight titles which went to R. Reynolds and John Stuart, while the flyweight title was won by G. Van Stone of Dartmouth.

Zaky Marshall of Mount Allison Academy was the logical contender for the featherweight crown, by virtue of his win over R. Reynolds of Amherst in the semi-final round, but he had to relinquish his right to meet Carl MacDonald in the finals due to a badly cut eye which he received in his semi-final match. Reynolds, who lost the decision in this match, went on to finish the fight to knock out MacDonald, who had won his match in the semi-finals against S. Urquhart of Amherst. It was a tough break for the Sackville fighter, as he was a smart boxer and a hard puncher and had definitely earned his decision over Reynolds.

It was learned last night from Joey MacDonald, proprietor of the Sporting Club Roll-Away bowling alley, that a City Candle-Pin Bowling League will be formed here and is expected to make its initial start for the winter schedule on Tuesday night. A meeting of all the team captains who intend to participate in the league will be held there tonight at 7 o'clock to draw up the schedule.

The intermediate rugby series between Prince of Wales College and the second team of Saint Dunstan's University, plagued all season by postponements of scheduled games, was once again dealt a blank card from the bottom of the deck by the weatherman, when the fourth and final game of the series which was scheduled for last Saturday afternoon was postponed on account of snow.

Although no definite date has been set as to when this final game will be run off as weather prospects don't look too bright for the early part of this week, the members of both teams are anxious to bring the season to a conclusion as many of them are playing "knockout".

Some Entries Missing

Despite the fact that Newcastle, Moncton and the Wanderers Club failed to send their representatives to the meet, which cut down considerably in the number of bouts, the eight contests which were presented gave the crowd their money's worth in smart boxing, keen competition and sportsmanship.

The Amherst team, which was sponsored by the Nova Nova Scotia Highlanders Sergeants Mess and under the management of Pete Mills, Amherst, put on a fine show, and exhibited plenty of boxing ability which earned them two of the Maritime titles.

Seven out of the eight bouts on the night's card were scheduled in the regular tournament competition, while the extra bout was an exhibition affair when Stevie MacDonald, Charlottetown stepped out of his bantamweight class to meet featherweight S. Urquhart, Dartmouth, with both boys ready putting on a fine performance and despite the disadvantage in weight, Stevie really fought Urquhart on even terms and had a judges decision given, it would have been a close one. The bout was arranged after the two other entries in the bantamweight division failed to appear, and MacDonald was forced to take his title by default.

Another outstanding match during the evening was in the light weight division between Jack Walker, Charlottetown, and Bob Gallant, also of Charlottetown which was by odds the most closely fought contest of the night. After both boys had fought to a three round draw decision, the crowd fight a fourth and final round to decide the winner, with Gallant getting the nod from the judges by a slight margin.

One of the most exciting matches was in the semi-final of the featherweight division, when Carl MacDonald of Charlottetown floored S. Urquhart, Dartmouth, four times in the second round for a count of nine, with the plucky Urquhart being saved by the bell on the fourth knockdown to come back in the third round and stay in there and fight to the end with MacDonald not able to gain anything more than a decision over his opponent.

For smart boxing and ring generalship, the honors for the evening went to little Willie Dunn, 64-pound Charlottetown paperweight who defeated another game little local boxer, Les Taylor, Dunn, who is a regular little ringmaster, displayed a style of boxing ability which is seldom seen even in the senior ranks and received an ovation from the spectators for his ability.

Following the evening's competition, gold medals for the winners and silver ones for the runners up which were donated by the Maritime Athletic Union were presented by the president, Brigadier W. W. Reid.

Toronto's Varsity Blues Win Title

TORONTO, Nov. 21 (CP)—Toronto's power-laden Varsity Blues toppled University of Western Ontario from here Saturday to iron throne they held since 1928 by trampling the mighty Mustangs 18-7 here Saturday in a sudden-death playoff game before some 20,000 fans.

The triumph gave the Blues their first title since 1928 and marked the first time the Mustangs gave up the crown since they became monarchs of the Intercollegiate Rugby Football Union in 1939.

The playoff, first since 1928, when Mustangs were defeated by McGill, was forced a week ago when the Blues trounced Western 23-8 for Mustangs first defeat in 28 straight games.

Playing under leaden skies and with a cold wind whipping across Varsity Stadium's soggy field, the Blues made good use of the razzle-dazzle plays of coach Bob Masters, former United States professional who piloted his first year as head coach.

Durnan Shuts Out Detroit 3-0 Despite Painful Facial Injury

DETROIT, Nov. 21 (AP)—Bill Durnan lost two teeth from a blow in the face by the puck tonight but it didn't deter the Montreal Canadiens goalie, who blanked Detroit Red Wings 3-0 in a National Hockey League game before 13,714 fans. It was Durnan's third shutout over Detroit this season in four meetings.

A partly deflected shot by Detroit's Jerry Couture whacked Durnan in the mouth with a 1 1/2 minutes left in the opening period.

Referee Bill Chadwick then declared the 10-minute intermission to give the Montreal goalie a chance to recover. The extra time was added on to the second session.

Turning away 27 Detroit shots 17 of them after his mishap, Durnan hung on to his shutout and now has given the Red Wings only four goals in four games. Earlier he blanked Detroit 6-0 and protected the Montreal nets through a scoreless draw with the Red Wings.

By winning tonight the Canadiens clinched within a single point of the co-leaders, Detroit and Boston, as the Bruins bowed to the New York Rangers in New York.
