Life Insurance In Canada

TORONTO, April 2—New life insurance to the value of \$97,821,000 was sold in Canada in February, according to figures compiled by the Life Agency Management Association and announced by the Canadian Life Insurance Officers' Association. The figures designate only the ordinary insurance but brought into force and do not include dividend accumulation, reinsurance, pension bonds, annuities, group or wholesale business. F.A.O. To Combine All Relief Groups

WASHINGTON, April 2—(CP)—Co-ordination of all international emergency relief agencies by the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization, was announced today by Sir John Orr, F.A.O. director-general.

Thus the first permanent United Nations organization to be established—it was completed at Quebec last fall—will take over a major immediate task as part of its long-range aims to help equalize food production and distribution throughout the world.

First important step in these co-ordination efforts will be a meeting of food ministers, or their equivalent from all the United Nations, to be held in Washington May 20.

For that meeting the F.A.O. hopes to have completed a "world balance sheet" on food which a board of experts has been working on since the F.A.O. completed organization in Quebec last Nov. 1.

At the conference, the food representatives will study the balance sheet and survey the possibilities of each country to improve production and distribution. They will seek to remove transportation bot-
