By Frederick Gardner Associated Press Financial Writer NEW YORK, Feb. 29 (AP)—A few rails, steels and farm implements staged a little rally all their own today, but the rest of the stock market refused to go along.

The final bell found averages off, although some issues had reached their highest quotations in a week. Shawinigan, in the Canadian group, lost one point to 16 1/4.

Selected stocks declined 1 of a point to 49 1/2. Transactions totaled 621,640 shares compared with 667,710 yesterday. It was the busiest day this week.

Stocks held steady all through the session behind the leadership of U. S. Steel which, at one time, was up more than a point. This advance was whittled to 3-4 by the end of the day by small sell-

Such rails as Santa Fe, New York Central, and Pennsylvania improved in step with Bethlehem, Republic and Youngstown.

On the downside were Loft, Air-Edwards, Pan American Airways, General Motors, Chrysler, Consolidated Edison, American Smelting General Electric, Sears Roebuck and Montgomery Ward.

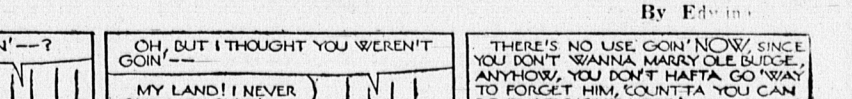
