There is a great rush for the stock of the Company here in Halifax.

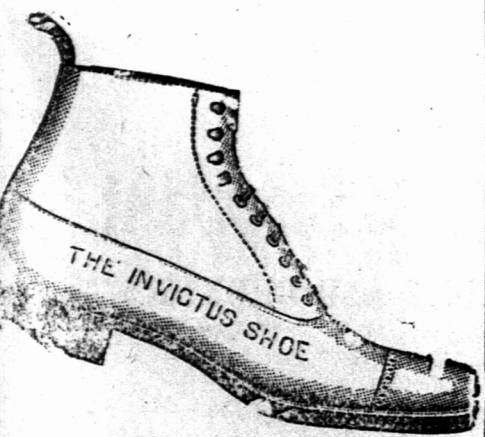
HIGGINS HAS LEAVE TO APPEAL.

BOARD OF TRADE RECOMMENDS A SITE FOR THE NEW STATION

A Large Meeting Last Night Unanimously Decides That The Location Opposite the Davies Hotel is the Best. Resolution Passed to that Effect.

The meeting of the Board of Trade last night was very large and representative. The president stated the object of the meeting and read a letter from John McEachern, Cherry Valley objecting to the tracks crossing Prince Street as the winter landing would be interfered with.

Hon. D. Farquharson being called upon pointed out that the people would only get what they demanded by persistently urging their demands before the Government. For twenty years we have wanted the station further west than it is. If we cannot get it opposite the Davies Hotel—and it would be well to delay even for years to get it there—then opposite the roundhouse is where we want it. An objection has been urged because of the cost but that should be no item. In proportion as we demand we will get. He referred to the large amounts given to the other provinces for stations etc. The strongest objection of Mr. Pottinger to the former site was that when the engine came in passengers would have to walk some distance to get on board. But the same objection was in many other places. Mr. Pottinger wants us to wait a little and if we are sure of getting anything then, we should wait, but we can get it if we demand it in the right spirit and hold to the point we want.

Thomas Handrahan would like to see the station at the foot of Great George St.

James Paton believed that the end of Water St. would be a good place as Mr. Pottinger objected to Great George.

Geo. E. Hughes, M. L. A., would like Great George St. opposite Queen Hotel or foot of Queen. The citizens wanted one of these sites.

Walter MacMahon thought the Great George street site would be cheaper than the roundhouse site.

Superintendent Sharp referred to the growth of the railway and the necessity for greater facilities. He would join in getting the station further west than the present site. The Railway wharf traffic is to be diverted at once to Prince street.

John Wheatley favored a site opposite Queen Hotel.

George Carter would like to see a station creditable to us, as in other cities.

Capt. Taylor advocated the block north of the freight sheds if no better were available.

O. Rattenbury was in favor of the western site.

Cap. McMillan would not like to see the winter landing closed up.
