TALC MILL BURNS WITH \$50,000 LOSS ZOAR, Mass., March 27.—This village temporarily lost its chief industry when fire early today destroyed the mill and storehouses of the Massachusetts Talc company. The loss on the buildings which were of wood, covered on the outside with galvanized iron, is estimated at about \$50,000 with partial insurance. It was announced by officers of the company that the mill would be immediately rebuilt. About 30 men were employed.

OTTTAWA, March 27.—The much-discussed question of United States warships on the Great Lakes came up for still further mention in the afternoon, when R. L. Borden read a newspaper clipping describing the big naval manoeuvres to take place next summer off Chicago in Lake Michigan. According to the story, it is proposed to wind up the manoeuvres by an attack on Chicago, with a sham bombardment. The defence will be conducted by men from the new naval training school to be located there, which will have quarters for 3,000 men and will cost three millions and a half. In order to have better manoeuvres it was proposed to supplement the training ship already there by a cruiser from the regular navy. It would be necessary to obtain the consent of the Canadian Government to bring the cruiser through the lower lakes, but this had been already discussed.

CYCLONE WINDS ACROSS PHILADELPHIA PHILADELPHIA, March 27.—A severe electrical storm, accompanied by a high wind, which at times blew with a deluge of rain, swept over the northern section of this city shortly after six o'clock tonight, leaving destruction and death in its wake. Buildings were demolished, houses unroofed and the New York division of the Pennsylvania railroad was placed out of commission temporarily by the demolition of its tower at Holmesburg, cutting off all telegraphic communication. New York trains are being routed via the Trenton cut-off, which branch of the Pennsylvania company was not in the line of the storm. Tacony, the section where the greatest damage occurred, was completely cut off from the rest of the city. Telegraph, telephone and trolley wires were blown to the ground and it was hours before the details of the catastrophe reached the central section of the city where the storm did not appear. The police station at Tacony was demolished. The evening squad of the policemen were preparing to leave for their beats when the roof of the building was blown away and they were broken by a sudden burst of wind. At the Tacony station of the Pennsylvania railroad an unidentified man was killed when a portion of the structure was blown away. Many houses in this section were unroofed or completely demolished. The section of Kensington, in the northwest, toward Tacony, several factories were destroyed, trolley wires were blown down and roofs of houses hurled to the center of the streets. A corner section of the three story brick factory of the Enterprise Co., manufacturers of woollens, at Trenton and Alleghany avenues, more than 100 feet in width was torn away, wrecking much valuable machinery. Three hundred and fifty men who were employed there, it is said, will be out of work at least a few weeks. The factory of the Enterprise Co., a large company nearby was struck by lightning but the flames were extinguished before much damage had been done. In the fashionable section of Germantown, the storm also caused havoc. The cupola of St. Michael's church at High and Broad streets was blown off, James Hall, at Germantown avenue and Sharpnack street, also lost its roof, as did the factory of the American Metal company, at Herman street and Germantown avenue. Telegraph and telephone communication was broken down, but up to a late hour no lives had been reported lost in this section. So completely was the Pennsylvania railroad line to New York tied up that no trains were sent over the New York division from this city and the tickets to Philadelphia were unobtainable at the New York end of the line.

THIS HEN SWIMS AND CATCHES FISH BELLEVILLE, Ill., March 26.—A hen that can swim like a duck, that's exactly what Henry Ude, of No. 401 South Fair street, Belleville, has in his possession. It not only can swim but it is a dexterous fisher, getting up for fish being one of its peculiar hobbies. Mr. Ude says that recently the hen caught a first class mess of fish, large enough for the main course at the Ude family dinner. The hen is the Indian game bird variety. Mr. Ude trained it for 10 months. He will use it for a decoy for ducks on shooting trips.

BEATRICE FAIRFAX DEAD IN NEW YORK LONDON, Ont., Mar. 27.—Word was received in this city tonight of the death in New York of Miss Winifred Scatcherd. Miss Scatcherd's writings were known all over the United States under the pen name of Beatrice Fairfax. She was employed by the Hearst papers. Her family was at one time social leaders in London. Miss Scatcherd left here about six years ago.

DANGER DROP FROM BALLOON CASSEL, Germany, March 26.—Four passengers in the spherical balloon Altermberg had a terrible experience while attempting a flight to the North Sea today. A hurricane drove the balloon, which ascended at Altermberg, in the Duchy of Saxe-Altenburg, into the Fulda River, which is over its banks on account of the floods, and the balloonists were rescued with difficulty. One of them was severely injured. The balloon travelled 150 miles in 3 hours.

DEPARTMENT STORE BOYS STUDYING FOR ADVANCEMENT The two largest department stores of San Francisco are paying one half the membership fees in the Y. M. C. A. for all the boys in their employ. Thirty boys from one store are in a "Life Problem group" with a department manager as leader. These boys are studying their business advancement while the habits and progress. All the boys employed by a given store have been organized for a Bible class with the son of a Jewish rabbi at the head. They are studying the Characters of the Old Testament. The new Y. M. C. A. building which opened three months ago was equipped to accommodate 600 boys. Already over 800 are enrolled, new members coming in at the rate of eight or ten a day. This will demand another building for the boys exclusively.

The Williamsport, Pa. Y. M. C. A. has put in a thousand dollar manual training equipment. It has 43 boys in a cabinet making class. The D. L. & W. R. R. Company has sent 102 of its men at its own expense to the Scranton Association for First Aid Training under C. H. R. Jackson, the physical director.

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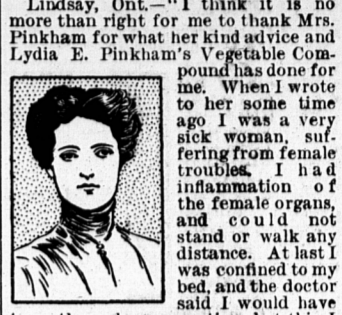
