GRANTS INCREASED—The Provincial Government grants to four hospitals in this province have been increased, it was announced over the week-end by Premier Thane A. Campbell. The grants to three hospitals were increased by \$2,000 in each case, bringing to \$6,000 the amount going to each institution. Hospitals affected are the Prince Edward Island Hospital and the Charlottetown Hospital, both in this city, and the Prince County Hospital at Summerside. A smaller and more recently established institution at Montserrat, known as the King's County Hospital, has a \$300 boost made in the government grant. The total government assistance to that hospital now stands at \$2,000.

R. C. A. F. Want Police And Marine Craft Officers
There is an urgent need in the R. C. A. F. for suitably qualified Police and Marine Craft Officers. Service Police candidates should be between the ages of 30 and 50, except that applicants with previous police experience will be accepted if they have reached the age of 27. They should have a physique above the average and a minimum height of 5' 10". Their education should be sufficient to enable applicants to make out intelligent and comprehensive reports. A natural attitude of alertness is desirable. They must be athletic. Previous police experience is desirable. Marine Craft Officers should be between 18 and 50, preferably between 30 and 40. They should hold a Board of Trade Coastal Master's Certificate, or the equivalent, for those who will go to sea. They should have had at least two years' (summer and winter) deep sea or coastal merchant marine service. Recent experience is necessary. Experience with small craft is a definite plus. Local coastal experience is desirable. Preference will be given to those of higher education. Candidates will be required to command and operate Seibeboats and other marine craft or take charge of a Marine Section. They must have good letters of recommendation as to their marine ability. Qualified applicants in these two trades are requested to write the R. C. A. F. Recruiting Centre in Moncton, N. B.
