

Marconi Works On New Marvel

LONDON, Sept. 27.—(C.P.)—Guglielmo Marconi is preparing a new marvel and in this connection a microwave transmitting station of secret design is being erected on the roof of "Electra House," overlooking the Embankment, London. So far the aim of the famous inventor is a profound secret.

Marconi is expected in London some time this Autumn, and the new transmitter will be then ready for him to experiment with and possibly utilize to reveal to the scientific world a discovery of outstanding importance. He has hinted at the possibility of being able to announce fresh inventions when he returns from his cruise in the famous floating laboratory *Electra*.

Huge "reflectors"—parabolic aerial wires attached to a wooden frame—could be seen from all over London while they were being placed in position. Inquiries resulted in the reply, "We cannot reveal the purpose of the aerials yet awhile." Directly beneath the aerials is the suite of offices and laboratories of the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Co. now being equipped as the finest radio research laboratories in London.

To Present Woolen Tariffs

OTTAWA, Sept. 27.—The first inquiry into British preferential rates and their effect on Canadian-United Kingdom trade will be opened here Tuesday by the tariff board. It was prompted by an application from the United Kingdom woolen trade for reduced tariffs in the Canadian market.

Under the Canada-United Kingdom trade treaty signed at the Ottawa Imperial Conference, Canada agreed to establish a tariff board, which, among other duties, would hear applications from British manufacturers regarding Canadian customs rates. The application would come formally from the United Kingdom Government but Westminster would take no part in the hearing before the board.

The application for reduction of Canadian woolen tariffs will be presented by H. B. Shackleton, Isaac Smith and W. A. Crowther, prominent English manufacturers and George H. Wood, Secretary-Treasurer of the Woolen and Worsted Trade Federation of the United Kingdom.

Dies In 106th Year

NOTTINGHAM, England, Sept. 27.—Mrs. E. T. Bousfield, widow of a well-known barrister and mother of W. R. Bousfield, K.C., former member of the House of Commons for North Hackney, died Thursday. She was 106 years of age.

When the King and Queen visited Nottingham in 1928 Mrs. Bousfield presented to Her Majesty a silk handbag which she had knitted. The King and Queen posed with her for a photograph. In the same year, with her 80-year-old daughter, Mrs. Bousfield was initiated into the Order of Good Templars when the Grand Lodge met here. She celebrated her 103rd birthday by addressing a meeting called to devise means for the alleviation of unemployment.

Want Coal And Oil From Russia

MONTREAL, Sept. 27.—Permission to import anthracite coal and oil from Russia is still being sought by a syndicate which wishes to export cattle in exchange for the two commodities, G. G. Serkau, Winnipeg lawyer, stated here today.

Serkau, who arrived here from Ottawa, claimed no knowledge of the present opinion of the Cabinet there on possible resumption of trade with the Soviet but expressed the belief some plan would be evolved to relieve the situation in the west where there was, he said, a large surplus of cattle with feed scarce.

No financing by the Canadian Government was sought, he said, as the necessary funds were already available from private sources. Permission to admit anthracite and oil from Russia alone constituted a barrier to the shipment of 100,000 head of Canadian cattle to Baltic ports.

Great Britain would not be critical if Canada allowed oil and anthracite to enter, Serkau added. Canada, he said, was taking as much Welsh and Scotch coal as could be supplied by Great Britain as she shipped to other countries and wished to retain her markets there. Any anthracite admitted by Canada from Russia would displace the same product now being brought here from the United States.

Canton Teacher Visiting Canada

Is Critical

EDMONTON, Sept. 26.—Miss Gertrude Bendelack, principal of St. Hilda's school in Canton, China, is a visitor here. Educated at Oxford and later taking her master's degree and diploma of education at Melbourne, university, Australia, Miss Bendelack in 1906 went to St. Stephen's College in Hong Kong, China's first girls' school. At that time girls were put in their covered rickshaws inside their own homes and were lifted out again only after they were within the school walls.

St. Hilda's was opened by Miss Bendelack in 1916. Last year one of her students completed medical work at Lyons, France; and another, who is head of a very large school in Hong Kong, has just gone back from America where she took an honors course. Many native girls from the school have qualified as nurses in the government hospital at Hong Kong, where they qualify under the British Nursing Association.

Four other graduates are at present on the teaching staff of their alma mater, but most of them are married as soon as they are through school, no less than 21 in the past year. Educated women are now much in demand as wives and mothers, Miss Bendelack says, and within the school compound there is a school where older married women are brought by their husbands to learn to read and write.

In close touch with the student problem in China, Miss Bendelack says that coming back from western universities they simply want to take the law in their own hands and are, as a matter of fact, much more thoroughly organized than any other group in China.

Recently they compelled the Chinese government to boycott everything Japanese coming into the country, and ransacked stores in search of Japanese goods. They through school, no less than 21 in beseege the government for the removal of their administrators in the colleges, and simply go on strike to attain their ends. One college in Canton had three vice-chancellors in one year, Miss Bendelack said. She herself has been able to keep her school free from government control and her students much trouble and embarrassment, as well as being able to give Christian teaching to those who wish to take it, although her pupils are by no means all Christians.

Miss Bendelack had the interesting experience last year of crossing the Pacific with Pearl Buck, author of "Good Earth". Asked the attitude of the Chinese people toward this book, Miss Bendelack said they resent it, because, while the cross-section of Chinese society which it describes does exist, it is in a most remote part of the country and does not reflect Chinese life in general.

It is a mistake to think that foot binding no longer exists in China, according to Miss Bendelack. Visiting in south inland China only very recently she told her interviewer that in the evenings she could hear the cries of little girls as their feet were unbound for the night. It is only in the treaty ports and where missions are established that the custom has been abolished.

Miss Bendelack is fond of her Chinese pupils. She finds them eager students and thinks it would be very trying now to teach western children, who would never cause her, she thinks, as her Chinese have done, to make very rigid rules that during certain hours of the evening, books must be left untouched.

Chinese education is much more difficult than western because its literature and history go back 8,000 years, and Oriental study is


