Arson Trial Venue Moving To Leipzig

BERLIN, November 24.—The Supreme Court trial of five men accused of firing the Reichstag building had passed its second stage today after a final session Saturday at the scene of last winter's blaze.

More than 100 witnesses appeared during the 27 sessions conducted in the Reichstag plenary hall. Among them were Reichsmister Wilhelm Goering and Propaganda Minister Joseph Goebbels, both of whom uttered bitter attacks on Communists, whom Nazis have accused of setting the fire.

Saturday's session was short and confined to examining several witnesses, including a Communist named Kemper, who refuted Friday's testimony by Otto Grothe, a former Communist functionary, that three of the five defendants attended a secret meeting just before the fire.

Defence counsel maintained that Grothe "involved himself in glaring contradictions" but Prosecutor Karl Werner replied that "I don't see any reason to assert that he (Grothe) made himself guilty of perjury; I see no ground for suspicion and do not propose to act on the counsel's advice" that the witness be charged with perjury.

Fertilizer Experiments

Striking results have been obtained by the Dominion Experimental Farms in Fertilizer trials for tobacco growing by varying the quantities of phosphoric acid and potash. As the quantity of phosphoric acid was increased in the fertilizer mixtures from 80 to 180 pounds per acre, the yield and quality of the tobacco was correspondingly improved.

"Runic" Stone Mystery Grows Symbols Stolen

WINNIPEG, Nov. 24.—A questioning sea of official scientific curiosity surged tonight where once Lake Winnipeg's waves lapped the rocks. The mystery of Manitoba's Runic stone had deepened and become complete with disappearance of that section of it on which were inscribed crude symbols supposedly made by Vikings a century and more before Columbus—but believed in some circles to be the weather-work of Mother Nature.

Bitter controversy which had raged to determine whether the markings were actually Runic inscriptions left by hardy Norsemen or merely effect of weathering was temporarily stilled as newspapermen and police pressed a vigorous search.

No theories were offered as to who could have stolen it. A gaping hole in a level field remained as mute evidence of the interest aroused in the boulder. Part of the stone remained, but the missing section was that which bore on its face the markings.

Newspapermen who investigated the find last week noticed the stone was split in two sections, one on top of the other. The missing part was the top half.

Steve Sygnetovich, the farmer on whose property the stone was located, was indignant at the disappearance of the important section of the boulder.

Royal Canadian Mounted Police, Winnipeg city police and newspapermen were all in the hunt. Tracks in the snow around the remaining half indicated a large number of persons had lifted the "find" onto a toboggan, and dragged it some distance away. It was conjectured the thieves had then placed it in a truck and driven away. Estimated weight of the missing portion was at least 300 pounds.

Suggestion was made in scientific circles, however, that persons hopeful of disposing of the stone at a handsome price, might have made off with it.

21,000,000 WOODEN SPOONS

TORONTO, November 24.—J. Lyons & Co. (Canada) Limited have just placed a repeat order with the John Lewis Industries of Ship Harbor, N.S., for 21 million wooden ice cream spoons to be used in connection with the catering business of J. Lyons & Co. Ltd., England. Orders for a total of 42 million spoons have now been placed with this Canadian wood industry during the year. This business is cited as another example of the benefits enjoyed by Canadian industry through the agreements reached at the Economic Conference at Ottawa.

LIVE TO EAT IS SLOGAN CALCULATED TO REMOVE FARM SURPLUS IN U. S.

CHICAGO, Nov. 24.—Live to eat rather than eat to live and watch the farm surplus disappear, was the advice of Frances Perkins, U. S. Secretary of Labor, before 600 members and guests of the Union League Club. "I want to see people eat past the subsistence line," she said in her address. "There's an art to eating. This country should set for art's sake as well as merely to keep alive."
