There was a very small quantity of produce at the city market yesterday. Pork was dull at eight to eight and three quarter cents a lb. The oat market was poor, white bringing forty-eight to fifty two cents a bus, and black fifty to fifty-eight. Butter was plentiful at twenty-two to twenty-four cents a lb and eggs at sixteen to seventeen cents a doz. Hay and straw were fair, pressed hay bringing \$8.50 to nine twenty-five a ton and loose forty-five to forty-eight a cwt, while pressed straw called for five-fifty a ton and loose thirty cents per cwt.
