Heavy Drop In Steel Production

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
NEW YORK, Oct. 30.—Reflecting the heavy drop in steel production and sales since June, the United States Steel Corporation's September quarter statement issued today showed a deficit of \$9,826,767. This compared with net income of \$5,350,214 for the June quarter and a net loss of \$2,717,014 for the September quarter last year.
Myron C. Taylor, chairman of the board, in a statement issued after the directors' meeting, said that while output had dropped to 20 percent of capacity during part of October, "at present the rate is 22 percent with indications of betterment."
The board declared another dividend of 50 cents on the preferred stock, payable Nov. 28, to stock of record Nov. 2.

LOWER BEDEQUE ELIMINATES NORTH BEDEQUE

Kinross Wins From Upper Freetown In Tug o' War At Bedeque Rink.

At the Bedeque Rink on Tuesday night before a large and enthusiastic crowd of about five hundred people in a closely contested tug-of-war battle, Lower Bedeque demolished North Bedeque from the finals for the Strong-Morrison Trophy. It was a hard fought battle between North Bedeque under Coach Robert Baker, and Lower Bedeque under Coach Willie Jenkins. Lower Bedeque won the first pull, having the advantage of about three inches when the referee called time after the teams had pulled for the full three minutes. In the second pull, after tugging for three minutes the starting ribbon remained at the starter's stick. Neither team could gain an advantage over the other and the referee declared the pull a draw. The judges then decided that the two teams must pull again to ascertain who would meet Upper Freetown in the final pull. Both teams again lined up but in this pull Lower Bedeque won in one minute and thirty seconds and were greeted with enthusiastic cheers by their supporters in the rink. Lower Bedeque won the right to meet Upper Freetown in the final pull this season for the Strong-Morrison Trophy next Tuesday night, at which time the Trophy will be presented to the winner. The North Bedeque team which went down fighting ruggedly were the winners of the Trophy last year. This Lower Bedeque team won from Kinross in Montague last Thursday. The tugs for the Island championship for lightweight teams were also full of excitement.
Kinross vs. Upper Freetown — In the first pull which lasted for the full three minutes Upper Freetown had the advantage when the referee called time of about two feet. In the next pull the Kinross boys got their bearings in strange territory and pulled Upper Freetown across the line in twenty seconds, and in the third and deciding pull Kinross was again the victors in about the same time. The Kinross boys were under coach Lloyd Robins of Kinross and Captain Harold Martin of Orwell. The Kinross boys are well trained and looked somewhat heavier than their opponents. The ranks of the team of Upper Freetown had been depleted through illness but they filled up the gaps and John Lewis coached in the place of Allison Profit, who was ill. The captain of Upper Freetown, Fred Paynter, deserves credit for contesting under the handicap.
The tug between Carleton vs. South Freetown for the Island Lightweight Championship was also keenly contested, Carleton winning both pulls, the first in two minutes and ten seconds and the second in two minutes.
There was a running-high jump keenly contested by five entrants, and won by Cecil Burns, Freetown, second being won by Allan Clow and Morris Deacon.

MONTREAL PORT SEASON NEARS CLOSE

MONTREAL, Oct. 30.—The Lady Somers, Canadian National Steamship, which departed from Montreal Oct. 17, leaves Kingston, Jamaica, today on her northbound voyage via Nassau and Bermuda, being due here Nov. 11. Her forthcoming visit to this port will be the last for this season, for when she sails again Nov. 15 she will terminate the northbound end of this voyage at Halifax.
The "Vagabond Cruise" ship Chomey, which left here Oct. 4 via Halifax for Bermuda, Puerto Rico, Barbados, Trinidad and Demerara, is now on her northbound trip back to Montreal, leaving Barbados yesterday. She is due at Quebec Nov. 10 and Montreal the following day. This, too, is her last voyage to the local port for the present season, being scheduled to sail again from here Nov. 15, which voyage she will terminate at Halifax on her northbound trip.
The "Vagabond Cruise" ship Colborne, which left Montreal Oct. 23, covering the same route as her sister ship Chomey, is now on her southbound trip to the West Indies Islands and British Guiana, being due at Puerto Rico Nov. 4. She will again make Montreal on her northbound voyage and will leave on her last sailing from here for this season late in November over the same route, completing the northbound portion of trip at Halifax.
The Lady Drake, sailing from Halifax Oct. 15 via Boston to the British West Indies and Demerara, arrived at the latter port yesterday and will commence her northbound voyage over the same route on Friday, the first time in Erie County since the Lindbergh kidnaping law had been invoked.

NOTICE

To Dog and Sheep Owners

The attention of Dog owners is hereby directed to the following sections of "An Act Respecting Dogs". During the past year there has been an alarming increase in the number of sheep slaughtered by Dogs roaming at large. In order to control this public menace, it is necessary that the provisions of the Act, as outlined, be rigidly enforced. The full co-operation of Dog Owners, Sheep owners and citizens in general is respectfully solicited toward this end.

Sec. 2. Every dog found at large without its owner or other person in charge thereof and not muzzled may be immediately shot or otherwise destroyed by any person, and any person may kill any dog which is seen pursuing, worrying or wounding any sheep or lamb, notwithstanding that such dog may be muzzled as aforesaid and notwithstanding that the dog may be in charge of his owner or other person; and any owner, keeper or caretaker of any enclosure in which foxes or other fur-bearing animals are kept for breeding purposes may kill any dog which he sees wandering in the neighborhood of such enclosure, not being in the charge of his owner or other person nor on his owner's property whether muzzled or not.

Sec. 3. Any person may kill any bitch which he sees at large without its owner or other person in charge thereof, notwithstanding that such bitch may be muzzled and every person owning or keeping a bitch shall suffer such bitch to run at large, thereby collecting a number of dogs, shall, for each and every such offence, forfeit and pay a fine or ten dollars.

The owner of any sheep or lamb killed or injured by any dog shall be entitled to recover the damages occasioned thereby from the dog or keeper of such dog by an action for damages or by summary proceedings before a Justice of the Peace, on information or complaint before such Justice, who is hereby authorized to hear and determine such complaint; and such aggrieved party shall be entitled so to recover on such action or proceedings, whether the owner or keeper of such dog knew or did not know that it was vicious or accustomed to worry sheep.

Woman Indicted For Kidnapping

BUFFALO, N. Y., Oct. 31.—Facing a penalty of from 20 years to life if convicted, Miss Alice Zimmerman, 26, of Lockport, today was under indictment for kidnaping and accessory to the kidnaping of Theodore B. Keating, prominent business man. The indictments were returned by the October Grand Jury yesterday, the first time in Erie County since the New York State version of the Lindbergh kidnaping law had been invoked.

Turn Cemetery Into a Shambles

AKINS, Okla., Oct. 31.—The cemetery where the bullet-ridden body of Charles "Pretty Boy" Floyd, one of the country's most spectacular outlaw killers, was laid to rest yesterday, was a shambles today.
Tombstones were overturned, fences broken and shrubbery trampled by a surging throng attendant at the services at the grave.
Grave stones became observation platforms for the morbidly curious. Several women fainted as the crowd milled and churned, fighting for bits of fence, a handful of earth from the fresh grave, stones and pebbles to carry away as souvenirs. It was estimated 20,000 persons jammed the little cemetery.
The Rev. E. W. Rockett, Baptist minister from Sallisaw where Floyd's mother and wife and child reside, read the service over the grave of the outlaw, slain by Federal agents in Ohio last week.
