More Canadians Arrive Overseas

A BRITISH PORT, May 26 - (CP) - After a speedy and uneventful crossing, reinforcements for the Canadian Army have arrived in Britain to complete their training with the experienced thousands of Dominion soldiers in British camps.

The reinforcements' arrival was disclosed today. Mostly they were infantry and armored divisions but the ancillary units also were well represented in the large body of men who came from every province in the Dominion.

They were welcomed here by the British Government representatives by Rear Admiral Sir Arthur Bromley, reception secretary to the Dominion Office. Before sailing from Canada they had been wished good-speed in a message from the Canadian Defence Minister, Hon. J. L. Ralston.

Though the crossing was uneventful and the weather warm and the sea calm, the men had little time to be bored on the speedy trip. There were daily lifeboat drills and the anti-aircraft boats were manned 24 hours a day. Sunderland and Catalina flying boats were part of the escort for the troops.

11 Naval Awards Are Announced

OTTAWA, May 26 - (CP) - Navy Minister Macdonald today announced that 11 operational awards - ranging from the O.B.E. to mention in dispatches - have been approved for Canadian Navy men who took part in the sinking of the steamship Matthew Luckenbach by the destroyer Columbia and in the probable damaging of a submarine by H.M.C.S. Georgian.

Lt.-Comdr. George Hay Stephen, D.S.C., commander of the Columbia, whose wife lives at 136 Queen St., Halifax and whose mother lives at Montreal, is made an additional officer of the military division of the order of the British Empire for his "exceptional service" in the Matthew Luckenbach salvage job.

Engineer Lieut. John Alfred Savory whose father lives at Hamilton took charge of the engine room during the salvage operations and becomes a member of the military division of the order of the British Empire.

Engine Room Artificer (3rd class) David George Bell of Toronto and Victoria Harbor, Ont., "proved of the greatest help and set an example to others during the salvage work" and wins the British Empire Medal, military division.

Of the eight mentions in dispatches, four were for participants in the Columbia's salvage work and four for the Georgian's attack on the submarine.

ROUPE TO APPEAL ORDER

OTTAWA, May 27 - (CP) - Justice Minister St. Laurent told the House of Commons today that Camille Houde, Montreal's inmate, 28-Mayon, will appear tomorrow before an advisory internment committee, following his request to appeal the order which resulted in his internment in July, 1940.

Answering a question put to him yesterday by Ligouri LaCombe (Cdn. Unionist), Mr. St. Laurent said Mr. Houde wrote to the justice department May 15, although his request had not been written in the prescribed form and had not reached the justice department within the prescribed period for appeal, his case would be heard tomorrow.
