SERMON ON BURNS.—In St. James' Church last evening, the Rev. Dr. Fullerton, in his typically eloquent style, delivered an interesting and inspiring sermon, founded on the 8th chapter of St. Luke, in which he dealt with Robert Burns and his works. SCHOOL INSPECTION.—The Superintendent of Education, Mr. R. H. Campbell, is at present engaged in carrying out his annual inspection of primary schools of the province. Some days ago he was down in the eastern section of the island, inspecting the schools at Souris. On Saturday he returned from the inspection of the Montague schools, on which he was engaged both on Thursday and Friday. This week he hopes to inspect the schools up west. He told a Guardian representative on Saturday, when asked for his opinion as to the condition in which he found things in the schools he has already examined: "I found the teachers working faithfully and meeting with a fair success; and the schools generally in fair condition—I examined all the grades in the schools." Asked as to the attendance, Mr. Campbell replied: "The attendance I found very good, considering the bad condition of the roads. Montague has an average attendance of over a hundred in both schools."

SUNDAY'S FIRE.—Early on Sunday morning, in fact, at or about a quarter to six o'clock, the Fire Brigade were called out to Wellner's building, Sunnyside, where in the section in which Mr. Gates formerly carried on a grocery store, a fire was discovered to be raging. 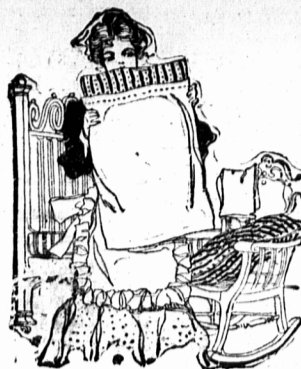

THE PANAMA CANAL COULD NOW BE USED. PANAMA, January 24.—The Panama canal has reached such a condition of completion that a large ocean steamer could now pass through, according to a declaration made by Colonel Goethals. He says there is thirty feet depth of water through the Culebra Cut and Cuzcoque Slide and it is his intention to send a Panama railroad steamer through the canal probably on April 1. A circular order issued by Colonel Goethals to-day, to go into effect on February

abolishes the Atlantic and Pacific divisions of the canal construction because of the nearness of completion of the work. Both ends of the canal are practically completed, only the electrical installation and cleaning up remaining to be finished.
