With the death of Rev. Dr. Edward Walker at Rollo Bay on Saturday afternoon, there passed away the oldest Roman Catholic priest in the Province. He was in his seventy-ninth year, and had been in the priesthood for fifty-five years.

Born at St. Georges, Prince Edward Island, on May 10, 1853, Father Walker was ordained to the priesthood in Charlottetown on July 10, 1877. Almost all his life since his ordination was spent in Rollo Bay. About six years ago he retired from active labour, but continued to celebrate Mass daily until a few days before his death. Dr. Walker offered the first Mass a year ago in the newly erected church at Rollo Bay. Rev. Dr. Walker was widely recognized as a brilliant scholar, and was known for his active interest in a diversity of subjects. Advancing years did not quench his zeal for books, and up to the time of his death, he continued to read widely. The funeral will take place Tuesday at 10 a. m. His Excellency, Rev. J. A. O'Sullivan, Bishop of Charlottetown, will officiate.

The potato crop in Prince Edward Island this year is estimated at 37,500 acres, with an estimated yield of 142 bushels per acre. This represents a decrease of about twenty per cent over last year, when the figures stood at 45,000 acres, yielding 160 bushels per acre.

Last week the Potato Growers Association shipped 40,000 bushels of seed potatoes on the S. S. Banto for Havana and other points in Cuba. Practically the whole shipment was put up in barrels, the varieties being Bliss Triumphs and Irish Cobbiers, No. 2.
