PUBLIC OWNERSHIP OF THE TRAFFIC.

Public ownership of the liquor traffic is what the Hon. Government has come to in its last days with the reverend editor of The Toronto Globe as its apologist. And this is the apology in part:
"We are quite well aware that opposition, strong opposition, would be offered to this line of procedure, not only by the retail trade, but also by certain sections of the temperance party. As has been made clear by the inquiry conducted by a representative of The Globe, some of the outside temperance leaders, emphatically those who speak for the Women's Christian Temperance Union, are de-finitely opposed to Government control. To some of them even the slightest responsibility for the sale of liquors is wrong and sinful. We respect the views of those who may stand at opposite poles from the position to which we hold, especially those who by their unselfish and redemptive work have earned the right to present their views; but in dealing with the concrete condition now before the country we are of the pronounced opinion that the future, the near future, is on the side of those who would take the tide of public ownership

as it rises and who would apply its moving principle to the liquor problem. Abolish private interest in the retail sale and the economic and moral problem of the bar-room, the treating custom, the adulteration of liquors, selling to prohibited persons or during prohibited hours, the saloon power in politics, and all other vexed questions of temperance reform will find ready and adequate solution."

Be it observed that the Ontario Government has come to this, after being submerged and throttled by the Gurney scandals, the Soo scandal, the Loggia ballot boxes and bogus ballots scandal, with candidates for Parliament imprisoned as common felons or skulking in hiding from the officers of the law, and still retaining the notion which would be humorous were it not so pitiful that the party thus debased and degraded is the natural repository of political virtue. The Government that has so long maintained an unholy alliance with the saloon and the liquor traffic will now take over the traffic and make it its own. Hereafter the state will make its own drunkards by the direct process without an intermediary and will turn all the profits, hitherto divided, into its own coffers. And the reverend editor wonders that the Women's Christian Temperance Union should be distinctly opposed to this!

How righteously the transaction can be argued out! We quote again from the reverend editor of The Globe:

"The unearned increment of the business—an enormous consideration in growing communities created by public action in reducing the number of licenses, belongs to the public and not to the private trader."

An enormous consideration! Think of all the money the state has lost by not claiming her own! And it will be so nice and so respectable to have state saloons, state purchased and state inspected whiskey handed over to the thirsty ones by the salaried officials of the state, and think of the patronage in appointing and promoting all the various grades of the whiskey civil service, due preference being given, of course to those now in the business. And at election times how handy it will be for the ministerial candidates, the men with a "pull," to get their supplies for the machine, and the committee rooms, and for the back townships, all at the Government liquor store, and no one the wiser, and with the comfortable assurance that the Opposition candidate cannot do the same! Why, the party thus equipped, even without the machine and the trick ballot boxes could sweep the country like wild fire! No wonder the pious party editor sees that it would be a good thing. And the Province would get its own, the entire profits of the trade, including the unearned increment! How strange that the Women's Christian Temperance Union should be distrustful of such an honest, pious, clean and respectable scheme of reform!

CANADA'S WHEAT CROP.

Ontario has had a poor wheat crop this year, said to be the poorest in fifteen years. The Department of Agriculture estimates the yield of fall wheat at 9,169,623 bushels, as against 17,242,763 last year, and the spring wheat crop at 3,471,103 bushels against 4,699,707 bushels last year. Thus the total yield is about 12 1/2 million bushels, and is 9 1/2 million bushels less than last year. And the quality is poor. The Toronto News claims to have it on the highest authority that an extremely small percentage of Ontario grown wheat is fit either for export or for mixing with the hard wheat of Manitoba. It will be mainly used for feed stuff for live stock and poultry.

But while Ontario thus shows serious symptoms of going out of the business of wheat raising, Manitoba and the Northwest make a good showing. If the promise of the early spring was not realised, the rather blue outlook of July proved more misleading. The Canadian Bank of Commerce has compiled a report based on information supplied by 700 correspondents, and the estimate is 69,000,000 bushels, compared with 51,473,000 last year and 63,883,000 the year before. The Ogilvie's estimate is from three to five million bushels more. Most of the crop is high grade. The better prices this year make the crop worth \$10,000,000 more than that of last year and \$9,000,000 more than that of the year before. Prairie Land is doing well.

The Sackville Post comes to hand this week in up to date, eight-page form, well printed and full of news. The Post is one of the bright semi-weeklies of the Mainland and is to be congratulated upon its recent improvement.
