James Carruthers, of New Glasgow, lecture on Shakespeare as a humorist, under the auspices of the 'Haliburton' Club of King's College. Before beginning his lecture the reverend gentleman paid a pretty compliment to King's College and Haliburton, saying that both were well known to him long before he left Scotland. He then gave a short sketch of the history of the drama. It was first born at the altar, under the ancient Greeks, and after eighteen hundred years, it was again born at the altar. The aim of the drama was to represent life and the prejudice which existed in the minds of many good people against it some fifty years ago had almost entirely disappeared. Mr. Carruthers, quotations from Shakespeare's humorous characters, Launce, Jacques, Touchstone, Bottom, Falstaff, etc., and his recitations from the third act of "A Midsummer Night's Dream," and the second act of King Henry IV. At the close of the lecture Canon Vroom proposed a hearty vote of thanks which was seconded by Mr. Charles Hensley and tendered Mr. Carruthers by Professor DeMille, president of the Haliburton Club.

REGARDING the report to the effect that the Skating Rink would be closed next Thursday night the managers wish to say that such is not the case. The managers have not been requested to close the rink and while they would be pleased to do anything to further such a loyal cause as the Patriotic Concert still they consider that there is room for both, and the closing of the rink would be unfair to the ticket holders who would not be able to squeeze into the Opera House and would lose an evening's skating while not being of any benefit to the concert. The Rink therefore will be open as usual.

The Halifax, Capt. Pye arrived this morning at 6 o'clock after a rough round trip; she did not leave here until 5 a. m. Wednesday on account of the heavy gale and tremendous seas on the passage, arriving at Boston at 5 p. m. Thursday. There was a fresh N. E. breeze leaving Boston Saturday, but at midnight she met a heavy S. E. gale, with snow storm; yesterday the wind shifted to the N. W., and from 12 to 4 blew fully 60 miles an hour. The officers say that the gale was somewhat similar to that experienced in November, 1898, when the Portland was lost, the Halifax having left Boston the same day as the Portland; as on that occasion the glass remained very high, and suddenly dropped when the storm broke forth. Her officers say that the wind yesterday was even stronger than when the Portland went down.

There is lots of room for people if they are willing to work. Mr. Tanton goes to Summerside to-day and will return to Sydney in March.
