Brantford Roofing To Install New Plant Equipment

An expenditure of about \$10,000 for additional manufacturing equipment to be installed in the Brantford Roofing Co. plant at Saint John, N. S. (Brantford Roofing (Maritime) Limited) was revealed by President Arnold G. Hitchon at the annual meeting of the company. This is the only manufacturing plant for asphalt shingles in the Maritimes and the new equipment installed will be part of a \$300,000 plant expenditure program to improve the company's manufacturing capacity for some time, as the need for homes far exceeds the supply of essential building materials.
