THE incoming steamships are constantly reporting heavy field ice and fogs of unusual density. The fogs this year off the Newfoundland coast, according to all captains, are of unusual frequency. Captain Lachance, of the steamship Polino, has been travelling the Gulf for the better part of thirty years, and stated recently that he had never experienced a summer when fogs off the Newfoundland coast were so dense and so constant. The Allan captains have imperative orders from the firm to stop their ships when in the neighborhood of the Newfoundland shore—provided the weather is such that they are unable to obtain their bearings.—Montreal Exchange.

ON Saturday afternoon Mr. Richard Crab gave his launch a trial and is greatly pleased with result. The launch is 28 feet long and has a 5 1/2 foot beam. The naphtha engine is four horse power and develops a speed of 900 revolutions a minute. It is expected that when everything "limbers up" the launch will be able to make 10 knots an hour. On Saturday seven knots was made with ease with the disadvantage of the engine not being bitted down. The engine is about 18 inches above the deck and is nine inches in circumference, the fly wheel being under deck and only the piston being above deck. The naphtha tank is placed in the rear of the boat and the consumption of naphtha is small. Mr. Grant states that 50 cents will run the boat for a whole day. By the pulling of a lever the propeller is easily reversed thus facilitating docking.

THE report of the Dominion Agricultural Department, 1900, in regard to the growing of sugar beets in P. E. I., is as follows: The question of the possibility of growing, in Prince Edward Island beets rich enough to make sugar extraction profitable, having recently received considerable attention in that province, we have analysed at the instance of Mr. A. Callaghan, Charlottetown, a number of roots raised there at various points during the past season. The information furnished respecting them is very meagre and simply states that "the seed was sown in the middle of June and the crop was harvested November 10. The drills were 18 inches apart, and the beets about 8 inches apart in the drill." The results show that these beets are for the most part rich in saccharine matter; indeed, they compare very favorably with those grown for sugar manufacture in Europe and the United States. Judging from the sugar content and degree of purity I am of the opinion the averages obtained indicate that a beet suitable for profitable sugar extraction can be grown in Prince Edward Island. The amount of work done in the investigation is not sufficient, however, to allow us to speak definitely, or decisively as to the success of the industry, if it were established.—Farming World.
