Wallace Beery In "Mighty Barnum" At The Prince Edward

"The Greatest Show On Earth!" You will walk out of the Prince Edward Theatre this week with that line ringing in your ears, and a conviction that your cinema-going heart that it's a perfect one-line description of the picture you have just watched unrel on the screen.

For "The Mighty Barnum" has everything that any picturegoer could want—and goes of it.

Wallace Beery offers a superb characterization as the world's greatest showman in this colorful, comedy-filled story.

Adolphe Menjou gives the best performance of his career as Mr. E. Walsh, his tipping manager and Virginia Bruce is enchanting as Jenny Lind, the lovely Swedish Nightingale, whom Barnum, in a moment of sublime reprieve from his midgets, fat ladies, sword swallowers and the rest of his freaks, introduced to a breathless America.

The film, begins just a century ago, in 1835, when Barnum left his sailing grocery store, rented a livery stable and became a showman exhibiting such acquisitions as a two-headed calf, a couple of reptile monstrosities and an aged negro named Joice Heth, hailed as 160 years old and the nurse of the infant George Washington.

The expose of this exhibit as a hoax and the subsequent breaking up of the museum by an enraged crowd of patrons with the head and lady shows masculine characteristics; the burning of the museum; the triumphant debut of Jenny Lind and the fiasco which Barnum's absurd social blunders make of the magnificent dinner he gives for her, are highlights of the picture, which ends with Barnum and Mr. Ballew Walsh parading proudly down the street in front of Jumbo, the world's largest elephant, heralding the inception of Barnum and Bailey, the Greatest Show On Earth.

The story is studded with warm human touches and chuck full of hilarious comedy. Janet Beecher shines as the stern New England wife who frowns on Barnum's wild ventures and Rochelle Hudson is excellent as his pretty ward, who has the misfortune to fall madly in love with the tipping Mr. Ballew. The sequences showing how the broke and discouraged Barnum, having lost his fortune neglecting his business to squire the lovely Jenny Lind, is inspired with the courage to start anew by a chance meeting with the tiny Topsy, a orphaned child with a lump in your throat and a tear in your eye.

Ratification Of Franco-Canadian Treaty Sought

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
PARIS, Dec. 12.—(C. P. Cable)—By a majority vote the customs committee of the Chamber of Deputies today refused to approve a bill ratifying the additional protocol to the Franco-Canadian trade agreement.

The chairman and several members of the committee raised objections to Article VII, which makes certain concessions by Canada dependent on the maintenance of the temporary arrangement for admitting Canadian wheat into France.

PAIR SENTENCED TO DEATH

PEMBROKE, Ont., Dec. 12.—Mary Cowan, who doctors said suffered from a sexual complex, was convicted tonight of murdering her husband at their Barry's Bay home last summer, and was sentenced to be hanged Feb. 27 with her school-boy lover, a brother of the slain man.

Mrs. Cowan, described as a morose woman with mental capacity of a child of nine years, was sentenced by Mr. Justice Kelleher, MacKay, who only yesterday sentenced her 17-year-old brother-in-law to be hanged the same day.

It was the youth, Allan Cowan, who shot his elder brother, Albert, husband of the condemned woman. He admitted in court he had done the shooting with a .22 calibre rifle as his brother lay in bed. Allan, in whose pockets police found marbles and a tin whistle, said he shot his brother at the suggestion of Mrs. Cowan who in numerous letters expressed affection for the boy and told him she preferred him to her husband.

Defense counsel sought to establish that neither woman nor the boy possessed any great sense of responsibility and recounted their acts when the crime was committed.

RED CROSS INTERNATIONAL FRIENDLINESS

Interesting Portfolios Received Here From Foreign Schools.

A delightful consignment of portfolios and booklets from schools in other lands has just been received by the Red Cross Office in Charlottetown for distribution to Junior branches in various schools in the province. Most of these were in return for portfolios sent last spring from this province and many of the correspondents write of the great interest with which they received the detailed information about Canada and Prince Edward Island and the friendly letters from the pupils here.

Three of the portfolios are from Japan. The one destined for Brooklyn School (Alberton R. J.) contains delightful samples of embroidery and miniature specimens of clothing. Those for West Devon and Clyde River schools also contain school work. Two portfolios from New Zealand are to be sent to Long Creek and Crapaud Schools. In each case these are from native schools where all the pupils are Maoris.
