The preacher pictured the little band of disciples setting out to conquer the world. He suggested the great forces to which they were opposed. There was the religion which had its home in Greece, the older cults of Egypt, and from Persia had come the oldest of them all—the worship of the sun-god. With these opposition was encountered from the Government also the first onslaught of persecution did much to discourage the Church, but said "I encourage the Church, for the faith of the Revelation" did much to inspire the people. These were "like ourselves good, bad, indifferent." God always uses the average man if he will let Him. The preacher showed how the Church taught men to think "Religion and Education always marched hand in hand." The real leaders were always the apostles of new ideas.
