Northam races next Wednesday afternoon. Paved road almost all the way. Splendid track and pleasant surroundings with a fine card of races should draw a banner attendance.

The program for Montague races August 17 is out. The classes are Free for All Pace, Free for All Trot, 2:16 Pace, 2:22 Trot and Pace. Good competition can be expected in all classes. In addition to 12-14 named horses there will be quite a number from the mainland taking part.

The largest attendance for years greeted Charlie Ballard's mid-summer meet at North Sydney last Wednesday. Twenty-nine horses competed in the various classes and although most of them were won in straight heats yet they were really interesting with most of the events won in lusty battles right to the wire.

Gall Harvester, the five-year-old son of Lee Harvester 2:16, brought from Ontario last Spring, proved a straight heat winner in the 2:27 Trot and Pace, heading a field of four other good pacers with something to spare. The time 2:13, 2:14, 2:15, 2:16 shows Gall Harvester to be a pacer of considerable class and he lowered his record of 2:17 1/4 made at North Sydney July 1st to 2:13. Dinah G., that was 2-2-4, is a four-year-old by Single G. 1:58 1/2. Silent Joe, winner of the 2:28 Trot and Pace at Amherst, July 10th, was 4-3-2. Dr. D. A. McIsaac's new import from Ontario, Peter at Court, was 3-4-5.

The 2:21 Trot and Pace found the competition mostly between Moon Glow 2:12 1/2-2, owned by Sam Walker of Halifax, and driven by Joe Hoos, and a winner in straight heats, and Peter Pin 2:17 1/4, driven by Billy Hood, whose summary was 2-2-2. Peter Pin is an ex-pupil of Earle Avery and was raced at the Provincial Exhibition last year by Neil Walker where he made an excellent showing in the trots. His performance Wednesday shows that he is in good shape and will be quite a factor in the straight trots.

Model T., owned by Richard Jabbe and driven by Mike Jabbe was 1-3-3 and the trotter Silk Girl 2:09 1/4 was 5-5-4. Horsemen will remember the two wonderful races Silk Girl trotted at the Provincial Exhibition, Charlottetown, in 1936 when she won the third heat of the 2:17 Trot on Wednesday in 2:11 1/4 and the first heat of the 2:15 Trot on Friday in 2:09 1/4, which was a new track record at that time. On that occasion she was driven by Frank Boutlier of Halifax. She afterwards set a new track trotting record for Halifax. The last couple of years she has not been up to old time form.

Mayor H. M. Sweeney of Bridgewater must have been tickled with the performance of the ex-Ohio pacer Rainey G. Henley 2:06 1/2-2. Up to Wednesday he had been meeting with indifferent success but was really going places that day. The first heat he got away

## Fight Fans Steamed Up Over Kelly - Duprey Fight Tonight

With fight fans keyed up to high pitch one of the largest crowds ever to witness a local boxing match is expected to be on hand at the Sporting Club tonight when Charlottetown's "Irish" Leo Kelly tangles with Jerry Duprey of Brewer, Maine, in a 10-round bout billed as being for the Maritime lightweight championship. Duprey, a clever boxer and hard hitter has a reputation of always being in the pink of condition and tonight he will meet an opponent in the person of Kelly in just as fine a shape. Kelly has been all seriousness in training for this scrap and is confident of stopping the victor in tonight's set-to, a scrap that should provide the fans with plenty of smooth boxing and heavy slugging. Both fighters will weigh in the vicinity of 108 lbs. at fight time. The semi-final between young Tom McCloskey and the smooth boxer Sonny Jones shapes up as a natural between two youngsters possessing loads of boxing ability and punching power. McCloskey has been coming like a house afire in recent bouts as he takes on all comers and is confident of stopping his opponent tonight, but Jones, starting on a comeback is equally confident of stopping the rise of the sensational 16-year-old lad from the East end of the City. A return bout between Killer Poulton of Charlottetown and Young Kelly from Bear River is bound to be a hard-hitting affair as both are out for a victory after fighting in a disputed draw in a three round bout two weeks ago. The remaining bout on the card between young Bonny McCloskey of the City and young Mooney of Peakes is also expected to produce fireworks and altogether it looks like fight fans are in for a night of "sock" and plenty of it. The first fight goes on at 10 o'clock daylight saving time and the main event getting underway at 11:15 sharp.

NEW YORK, July 26 (AP)—St. Louis Cardinals and the Dodgers used a grand total of 33 men today, fought it out for two hours and 40 minutes—and wound up in a 2-2 tie as rain stopped their game at Brooklyn in the last half of the 10th inning. Terry Moore hit two homers for the Cards and Don Pageit drove in Enos Slaughter with a long fly in the top of the ninth to tie the score and send the game into overtime. The game will be played off as part of a doubleheader tomorrow. Laughing Larry French was positively hilarious at the expense of the Giants at New York. The Chicago Cubs' lefty tossed a seven-hitter and drove in four runs with three singles, himself, as he and his mates took Bill Terry's outfit apart 14-1. The victory moved the Cubs to within two games of the third place New Yorkers in the National League pennant chase. Pittsburgh Pirates blanked the Bees 9-0 at Boston behind the five-pitching performance of Ken Kintzleman, their young southpaw. Despite the presence of Max West in their lineup for the first time since the All-Star game, the Bees were unable to advance a runner beyond second base.

# OLD HOME WEEK RACE PROGRAM

## Classes and Events for Afternoons of August 13 to 16

Below will be found the program of racing to be held in connection with Old Home Week, plans for which were made some months ago when it was definitely decided that an Exhibition could not be held because the Federal Department of Agriculture had discontinued grants to fairs with the exception of those which had already published their programs.

As the Provincial Exhibition Association had functioned for half a century holding Exhibitions every year with the exception of one or two and race meetings every year, and as its plant had become known as the People's Playground, it was considered that a race program with Vaudeville should be held.

Tentative arrangements were made with George A. Hamid of New York for an outstanding Vaudeville contract which was to have been routed to Halifax, N. S., where races were also to have been held and would have been but for the fact that the Department of Naval Defence took over the Exhibition grounds and track for naval training. However, another route was made by Mr. Hamid and a guarantee given that the complete Vaudeville program would come to Charlottetown, so the Directors met and decided to put on Old Home Week on the days which had first been selected—August 13th to 16th inclusive.

The harness horse program will be the same as other years and will no doubt bring together as large if not a larger list of horses and equally good racing will result.

Interpersed between the heats of the harness horse racing in the Maritimes will be some of the best Vaudeville ever seen in the Maritimes or in fact in Canada, including the Four Queens of the Air and Ace from California, whose act is one of the most spectacular before the public today and includes a double slide for life, Billy Outten's Water Circus, which was a sensation in Florida last winter drawing over a million people, Laddie Lamont, the Scottish boy from Killtearink who is internationally famous, the Victoria Troupe of six bicyclists from Great Britain, the Australian duo, White Brothers, and DeCosta and Lenore, musical specialists and singers, and the Golden Gate Revue, originally from California. Most of these acts are routed for the biggest Exhibitions in the United States and Canada this season so that our people will have an opportunity of witnessing as good as is presented to any audience either in the United States or in the Dominion.

In the evenings there will be a wonderful show with jumping and other riding events staged by our riding clubs. The Vaudeville acts will show up in splendid relief on the stage lighted as it will be with colored lights and beautiful background. A Master of Ceremonies will keep the show moving right along and at intervals between the acts a male singer of excellent reputation will render popular songs.

Lenore of DeCosta and Lenore will also give individual numbers as well as appear with her partner. There will be six numbers of the Revue in varied costumes as well as two acts with Laddie Lamont, two with the White Brothers, two with the Victoria Troupe and the Spectacular Queens of the Air with a double slide for life. Billy Outten's Water Circus with Billy diving from a hundred foot perch into a shallow tank. He sets fire to himself in midair and comes down a ball of fire when he hits the water.

The evening shows will be spectacles of more than ordinary interest and will no doubt attract tremendous audiences. From all parts of the Maritimes parties are planning to come to Charlottetown so those catering to guests can be assured that Old Home Week should bring them as good patronage as the Exhibition did.

In these days of anxiety and strain when one is liable to concentrate overmuch on news of events in Europe, it is well to take some relaxation. In Margaret Currie's column of the Montreal Daily Star for July 6th this occurs:—"Believe it or not, but a prominent Montreal doctor told me the other day that he and his colleagues were seriously disturbed about the increase in 'nerves' among their patients. There were many people on whom the war had a profound emotional effect. . . . one psychiatrist suggested that when you begin to feel jittery you should get outdoors, engage in some sort of active exercise, seek out your friends, read something light, go to an amusing picture or just—go fishing. In short, try to divert yourself in some way."

The Provincial Exhibition Association will give \$500 to be distributed among the winners along with the amount paid in for these Futurities.

**SPECIAL PRIZES FOR DRIVERS AND OWNERS**  
A special ribbon will be given to the owner of the winning horse in each race, THE MACDONALD TO-BACCO COMPANY OF MONTREAL has donated a beautiful Trophy, known as the British Consols Trophy, which will be awarded to the Driver scoring the most points during the meeting. This Association will also give \$20 to the driver scoring the most points during the meeting, \$10 to the driver scoring the second most points during the meet. First place counts as five points, second place three points, third place two points and fourth place one point. \$10 will be given the winning driver in each race. \$10 will be given the driver driving the fastest heat trotted during the meet and \$10 to the driver driving the fastest heat paced during the meet.

Ten Dollars will be given the caretaker of the horse trotting the fastest heat and Ten Dollars to the caretaker of the horse pacing the fastest heat.  
Five Dollars will be given to the caretaker of each horse winning a race in the trotting and pacing classes during the meet.  
Fifty Dollars will be given to the owner of the horse that beats track pacing record of 2:05 1/2 except as provided for below. Fifty Dollars to the owner of the horse that beats track trotting record of 2:08 3/4 except as provided for below. In case two horses beat the above records then the awards go to the fastest horse. If two horses tie for the awards the money will be divided equally.

**GENERAL CONDITIONS**  
(ALL RACES MILE HEATS)  
The Charlottetown Race Track is now one of the fastest, best laid out and cared for tracks, and surely the most beautifully situated of any in the Maritime Provinces. A great deal of effort will be made to keep it in apple pie order, all through the period before the races and during the races so that no horse will become unsound or suffer injury and to enable them to make fast time.  
Horsemen (providing they are racing exclusively at our meeting) by wiring at our expense notifying us of their arrival will be met at the train and their baggage transferred to the grounds without cost to them, also taken away without cost to them. Every effort will be made to make the horsemen's stay pleasant and send them away feeling that they have been well treated.  
All races to be raced on three heat plan: 10 per cent of each purse will be awarded to the winner. The remainder will be divided into three equal parts, one part to be raced for each heat. In the event of there being three heat winners they shall have a fourth heat to determine the winner.  
All purses divided 40, 30, 15 and 12 per cent. Entry fee 5 per cent. Five per cent of the money raced for each heat will be deducted from the first and second horses; 3 per cent from the third horse and 2 per cent from the fourth horse. Entrance fees and deductions do not apply to Futurities.  
Six horses to enter and four to start.  
Rights reserved to change program, reject any entry, or if entry appears to lay over the field to the extent that there is not, in the opinion of the management, sufficient to a competition, then the said entry may be transferred to a faster class or entry fee refunded, bar any driver and to declare race off on account of bad weather, or failing to obtain satisfactory number of entries or starters to transfer horses to another class to which they are eligible, re-open or substitute another without advertising, or alter or extend racing dates.

Additional entries of an individual ownership may be made in any class by the payment of 1% on closing date, but entries of separate ownership, although in the same stable must pay installment in full.  
Two entries of the same ownership may start in the same race, providing the full 5% is paid on each starter, the drivers having the approval of the judges.  
All horses with names of drivers will be declared in at 11 o'clock a. m. Daylight Saving Time, the day prior to the race, when positions will be drawn to enable us to print score cards with actual starters.  
Eligibility based on U.S.T.A. money winning classification.  
The Exhibition Association assumes no responsibility for any accident or damage to any person or property during this meeting, and this understanding is part of this contract. Owners must assume any damage to property or persons caused by drivers, attendants or horse.  
Hay, straw and stabling free.  
Races called at 2 P. M. Daylight Saving Time.  
U.S.T.A. rules to govern except where they conflict with these conditions. Be sure and bring your eligibility certificates and driver's license.

**THE OFFICIALS**  
The officials will be selected for their experience and reliability and will be instructed to carry out the rules firmly and fairly. All purse money will be paid immediately after the race and horsemen are asked to get same from Secretary before leaving.  
**PRESENTATION OF PRIZE MONEY**  
Friday evening the President will award special ribbons, prizes to the winning owners, drivers and caretakers.
