CH'TOWN CYCLING CLUB IS ORGANIZED

Constitution Adopted And Thirty Eight Members Enrolled. Plans Made For Bicycle Hikes.

An enthusiastic group assembled at the Y. M. C. A., last evening to complete the business of organizing the Charlottetown Cycling Club.

The meeting was opened by the chairman who explained the objects of the club. Mr. Jack Gordon then addressed the meeting and explained in some detail suggestions and proposals for the operation of the club.

The report of a nominating committee appointed at a meeting last week was then brought in and adopted by the meeting. The officers are as follows: President, Harry Lewis; vice-president, Frank MacIntyre; secretary-treasurer, Foster Pickard.

The different clauses of the constitution were then taken up and after some discussion and revisions were adopted.

A number of suggestions were offered as to colours for the club. A vote was taken and it was decided that the colors should be red, white and blue.

In the enrolment that followed some thirty-eight members were signed up.

The following committee was appointed to assemble riders for hikes, races, etc: Byron Burns, Abbie Weeks, Jimmy Dalling, Prentis Andrew, Ed. Hornby, Willie Warren and James Rattenbury.

An announcement was made by Mr. Ira Reid of R. T. Holman Ltd., to the effect that the Holman-Pickard race would be put on this year as usual. The date, however, has not yet been set.

An advisory committee of seven was appointed to assist the officers of the Club. The members are as follows: Messrs. J. Gordon, J. M. Diamond, A. Affleck, I. Reid, F. Pickard, G. Partridge and N. Mathieson.

CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

Article I. The organization shall be known as the Charlottetown Cycling Club.

Article II. Its objects are:

(a) To promote the general interest of cycling in Prince Edward Island.

(b) To encourage and facilitate touring.

Article III. Membership in the association shall be divided into three classes: junior, senior and honorary.

(b) All fees pertaining to or for membership shall be paid to the secretary-treasurer.

(c) The fees shall be as follows: junior (17 years and under) 50c, senior (over 17) \$1.00, honorary (non-riders) not specified.

(d) All memberships shall expire on May 1st of each year. Each member shall be allowed 6 months for reinstatement by paying the annual fee.

Article IV. (a) The officers of the association shall consist of a president, vice-president and secretary-treasurer, who shall nominate members for such committees as may be deemed necessary. Such nomination to be subject to the approval of a general meeting. These committees are to be composed of the president and vice-president and three other members.

(b) Ten members shall constitute a quorum at a general meeting.

Article V. It shall be within the province of the club to suspend, for such time as it may deem proportionate to the offence, for violating any of the following clauses:

1. Unfair dealing in connection with cycle racing.
2. Ungentlemanly conduct.
3. Entering a class race to which his record does not give him the right of entry.
4. Suppression of true figures and rendering of false figures to the offic' al handicappers.

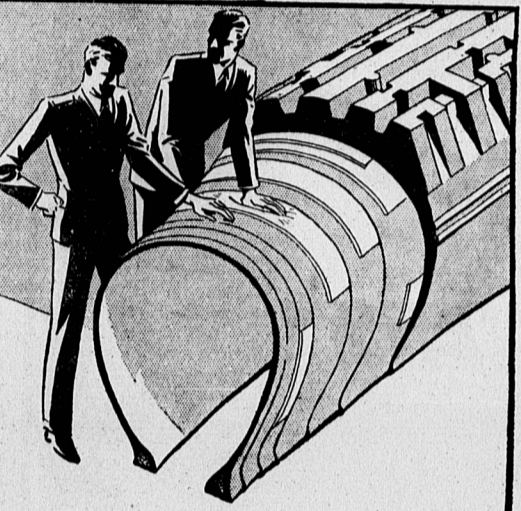
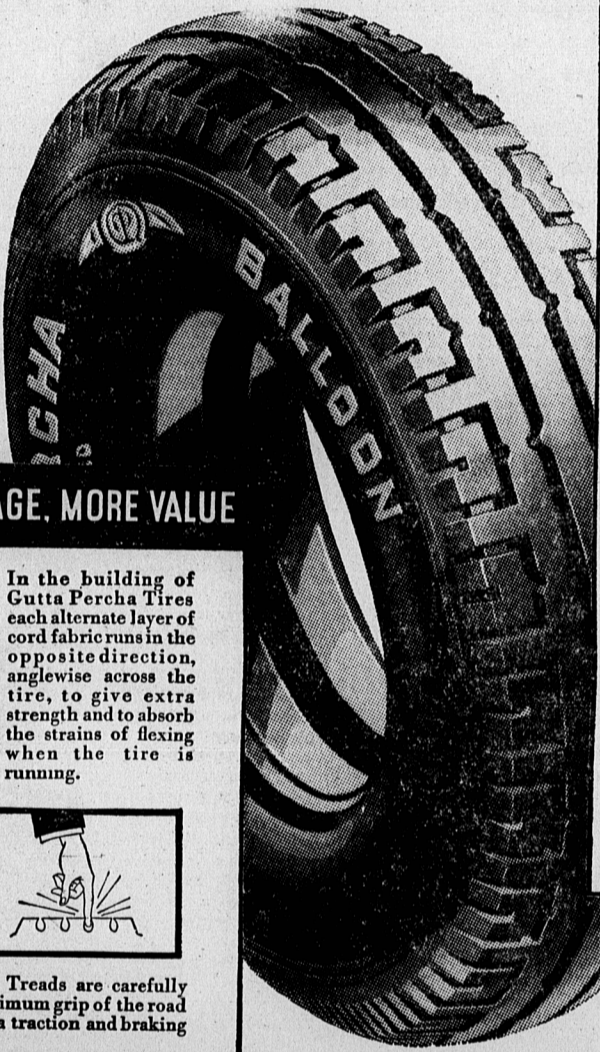

MY MONCTON VISIT

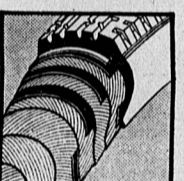

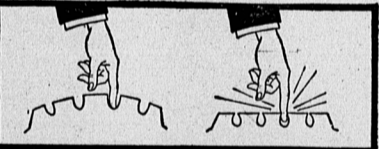

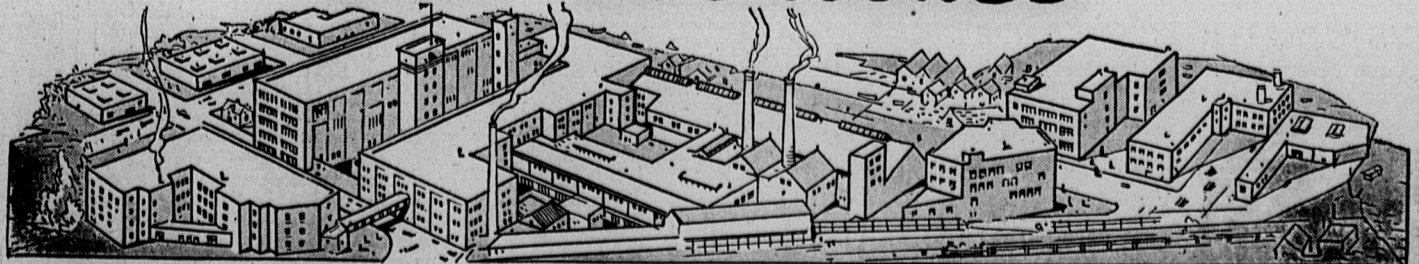
