VICE-REGAL DOGS HAD HEALTH TESTS OTTAWA, April 23.—Democratic-minded dog fanciers have been bombarding the federal agriculture department with queries about the entry into Canada of three dogs, which accompanied the Governor-General, Viscount Alexander, from England.

And they had their answer Wednesday in a department statement, which said there was no doubt the Alexander's three sheepdogs, Tessa, Lassie and Prince—had met the right health of animals import regulations.

The statement explained that dogs originating in Great Britain, Northern Ireland and the Irish Free State and shipped direct to Canada were admitted without restrictions if accompanied by a certificate as to the animal's origin.

Save The Children Fund

TORONTO, April 23.—Thirty-one cases of children's clothing valued at over \$3,200, have been shipped to the London Committee of the Save the Children Fund by the Post War Service Committee of the I.O.D.E. in Canada, it was announced today by the Canadian Committee of the Save the Children Fund.

These cases contain layettes, afghans, children's clothing and quilts, as well as children's shoes and blankets. Shipping the clothing now will make it possible for S.C.F. workers in Europe to distribute it well in advance of next winter's cold weather.

A typical case of clothing contains 306 pieces of clothing; 29 pairs pyjamas, six slips, 18 vests, 11 pairs panties, 53 nightgowns, 39 combinations, three petticoats, 26 pairs of bloomers, 26 dresses, 35 pinafores, eight caps, four scarves, seven pairs socks, 11 pairs slippers, five boys' shirts, five overalls, five hats and eight sweaters.

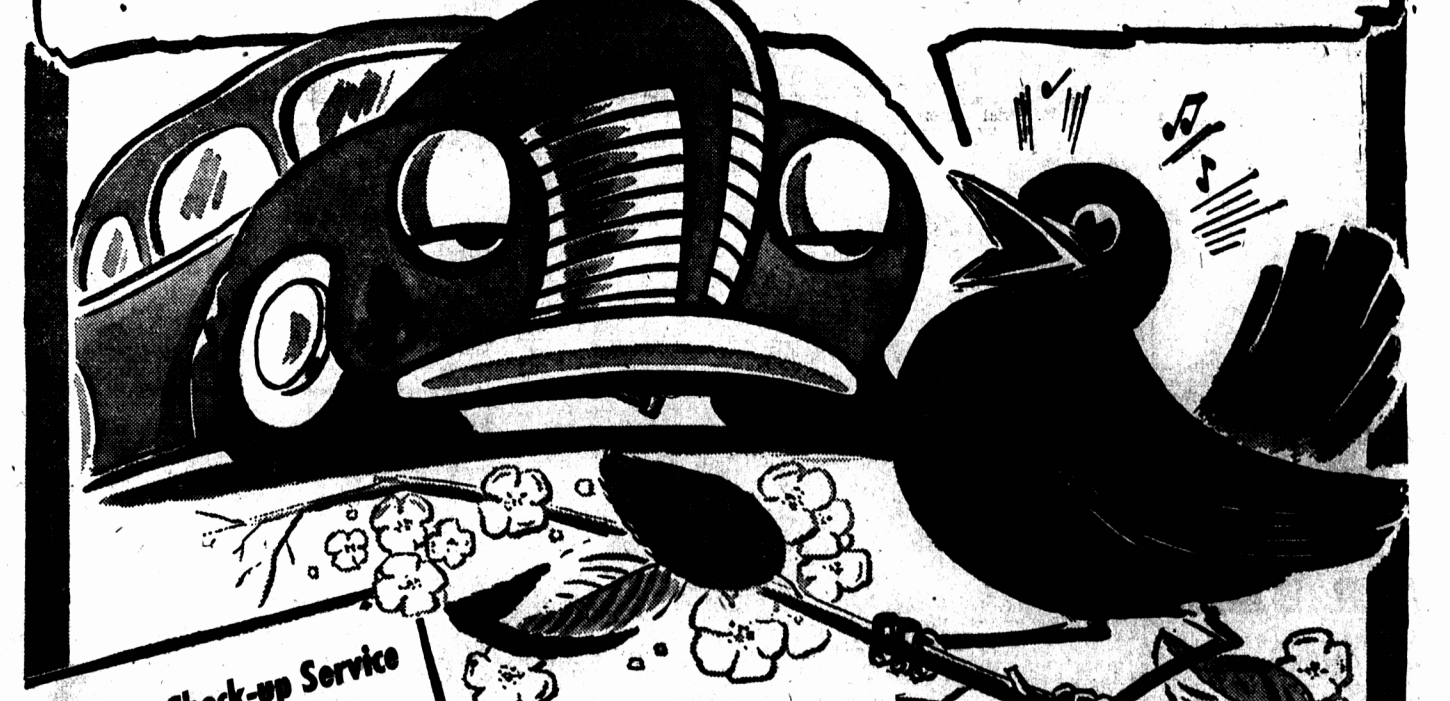
